Oflag's Six-Month Anniversary to be Celebrated With Ersatz Scotch, Films, Thunderous Oratory

Morning Report Rises As Mercury Drops

The morning report veered sharply upward again in November with the arrival here of 35 new officers.

Of the first group eleven are air corps men shot down over Germany.

Representing 22 states back in the old country, the new officers are:

Lt. Col. Gooler was captured at Tobruk, June 21, 1942, and was interned for more than a year by the Italians. In September, on his way to Germany, he escaped but was recaptured.

Lt. Col. Schaefer was captured in Sicily and Lt. Col. Jones was made prisoner at Salerno. Both commanded battalions.

Week-long Festivities Begin Tonite at 7:15

Gigantic celebrations this week will mark the first semi-annual anniversary of Offizierlager 64.

Gala ceremonies tonight conducted by Capt. Jim Barker in the mess hall will begin the six-day jubilee, commemorating six months at Alzburgund and climaxing next Monday with solemn oratory by Lt. Col. John Van Vliet.

Included in the festivities will be nightly blackout bonfires, simulated fireworks, fish-less political fish-fries, conducted by Senator Roy (Texas) Chappell, of Texas, and mirage scotch parties given by Lt. Col. Louis Gershenow at the canteen.

Capt. Barker's talk tonight will be "Six Months at Oflag 64 Have Made Us What We Are Today," or "Home Was Never Like This."

Tomorrow and Friday, German films will feature, "A Boat Trip Down the Danube From Vienna" or "The Vistula Was Never Like This."

The Quiz Program Saturday night will feature questions relating to the camp's six-month history and other questions.

Col. Van Vliet on Monday will talk on "Where Could You Find a Better Climate than at Oflag 64?" or "Hawaii Was Never Like This."

Anti-climaxing the barbed-wire anniversary services, six of the more prosperous messes plan to light half-candles Monday night in memory of last June 6, when this camp was established for US ground force officer PoW's.

Today it is the temporary residence of more than 300 American officers and some 40 American and British enlisted men.

The half-year period thru which we have passed has seen the building from nothing of a camp life which includes a fun-packed, diversified program of entertainment, a helpful school set-up, a spirited sports schedule, a well-stocked library, an efficient canteen, a satisfying mess, a model barber shop, a combination tailor-cobbler shop, and a smooth-running tin store.

This building of a fuller camp life has been the work of many. It has been and is for the benefit of all.

Mail Operations Hit New Highs In Volume, Speed and Output

Next to a good serviceable passport to the States, fast mail from home seems to be most in demand around these parts.

Although the average time of transit for letters received is 99 days, some officers have received letters that can be classed as current.

Lt. James Shoaf received a letter on the 26th of May which was posted on the 29th of April from Morgantown, W. Va., a total of only 28 days in transit.

Lt. J. L. Cockrell received two letters on Sept. 10th mailed from the states on August 6th and 12th for a total of 36 and 30 days respectively.

Letters from England seem to be making the trip in from two to three weeks. Lt. J. L. Creech and Lt.

R. J. Oshlo have letters from there in 14 days.

The "Big Ten" operators through November 1 were Lt. Col. James Alger with 117 letters; Lt. Amon Carter, 114; Capt. Stephan Kane, 110; Capt. George Juskalian, 106; Lts. Earl Buckley and John Scully with 105 each; Lt. Lloyd Warren, 104; Lt. Col. John Waters and Lt. William Rudel, 103 each; and Capt. Lumund Wilcox and Lt. Robert Hutchison with 101 each.

Total letters received during the past four months with their average transit times were 505 in July with an average of 59 days, 1587 in August with an average of 100 days, 3152 in September with a 95 day average, and 2907 in October in an average of 99 days.

He is quite decided, tho, on his coming winter sports carnival. Says Johnson, "Every man in camp should go in for some sport for his mental as well as physical well being."

Repatriates Will Raise Hell With N. Y. Nite Life, Preview Indicates

Food, Liquor Stocks Vanish As Kriegies Hit City

New York, December 1, 1944. With the arrival here yesterday of 300 American army officers from a PoW camp in Germany, the city faced a major crisis.

The Colony, LaRue and other swank eateries experienced food and liquor consumption six times normal.

Night club boom was unparalleled in cafe society history.

"It's incredible," said Sherman Billingsley. "We ran out of Scotch and hat-check girls at the same time."

Arrest of 153 self-termed "Kriegies" on charges of disorderly conduct, assault, battery and attempted rape brought to a climax a dinner in which 36 people were injured and damage was done in the luxuriously appointed Wedgewood Room of the Waldorf-Astoria estimated at 10,000 dollars.

According to Ivan Rachamanicho, maitre d'hotel, 150 of these repatriates entered the dining room shortly after 8:00 P. M. Each carried a cardboard box and a small stove constructed of rusted tins. All were inebriated.

They abused waiters because the soup was not on the tables, flung glasses of iced water onto the floor and shouted for hot water, while some sat on the dance floor and kindled fires in their improvised stoves. At this point most of the patrons left hastily.

They then demanded a dish called "Prem" and when informed that this was not available proceeded to overturn tables, throw silverware and threaten the few remaining customers.

The police arrived and after a half hour battle in which 36 policemen sustained injuries, the party was arrested and brought to the East 47th St. Precinct.

Miss Sadie Schling, cigarette girl at the Wedgewood Room, was interviewed at her home in Flatbush, where she is recovering from minor cuts, bruises and shock.

"I'm a good gurl," said Miss Schling. "It was orful."
