

Aten wrote book on time as PO

Capt. Frank N. Aten was a pris-oner of war during World War II and wrote a book on his experiences.

Aten was cap-tared in northern Africa by the Ger-mans on Valentine's Day 1942. He spent more than two years in POW camp in northern Poland. "He was al-

lowed to corre-spond with us,"

ATEN spond with us," ATEN
said his wife, Frances Riggs Aten of
San Antonio. "He could write a card
a month, but it was censored."
Frank Aten died Friday at age 73

in a local hospital.

Aten and his wife were married just four months before his capture.

"It was devastating," said his wife. "Still, I was thankful he was a prisoner instead of being killed. I was worried to death, of course."

was worried to death, of course."
Aten tried to escape five times, but was always caught. He was finally liberated by the Russians after being incarcerated for 26 months.
"I met him at the San Antonio railroad station," said his wife. "He was very thin, they almost starved him to death."

Aten was awarted the Silver Star

Aten was awarded the Silver Star while he was still a POW. His experience prompted him to write a book, "The Name on the Wall."

"Every time he was placed in a different cell, following the escapes, he would write his name on the wall," explained his wife.

He recently finished writing his book.

"We had just gotten it back to be proofread when he got ill," said his wife. "I am still hoping to get it pub-

A native of Tyler, Aten moved to San Antonio when he was 17 to join the Army. He has lived here since, except for a few years when he lived in Kerrville following his retirement in 1953. For a while he worked at the Schreiner College Bookstore.

At home, Aten kept himself busy with his workshop. He also enjoyed gardening, fishing and playing domi-

"He was a wonderful person," said his wife. "He had a wonderful per-sonality. He was very unselfish and very giving of himself. Everybody loved him."

A patriotic man, Aten received numerous medals including a Victory Medal, an American Defense Service Medal and a Korean Service Medal with two Bronze Stars.

Other survivors include a daughter, Sharron Pacheco of Eagle Pass; two stepchildren, Bobbie Semlinger of San Antonio and Michael Kelly of Ingleside; three sisters, Anna Belle Funderburgh, Alice Nell Parnell and Bertie Gene Steel, all of Tyler; two grandchildren; four stepgrandchildren; and seven great-stepgrandchildren.

Services will be held at 9:15 a.m. Monday at the Sunset Memorial Home Chapel. The Revs. Charles Etheridge and Rob Grimes will officiate. Burial will follow in Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery with U.S. Army honors.
