
OFLAG 64

Officials Ask Former POWs, Kin To Delay Requests for New Medal

WASHINGTON — Although the new Prisoner-of-War Medal is entering the Defense Department supply system, Pentagon officials say former POWs and their next of kin should delay attempts to get the decoration until procedures are in place for issuing it.

Officials fear recent press reports indicating the medal is almost ready to be distributed might cause ex-POWs or their families to overwhelm the military services

with requests.

Mid-February is the earliest that military officials will be ready to accept applications. There had been hopes the medal might be

ready months ago.

A Pentagon official said the military still is waiting for required clearance from the Office of Management and Budget before telling the services to start issuing the award. OMB must approve application forms as part of the government's paperwork reduction effort.

"We received the request from DoD for paperwork clearance Dec. 15," an OMB spokeswoman said. "It takes 60 to 90 days for public comment, and for consideration for approval by OMB. Then, if it has been approved, DoD can start using it."

Responsibility for issuing the medal will rest with each service, the Pentagon official said. Representatives still are holding planning sessions to work out procedures for distribution.

Those eligible for the medal are present or former U.S. service members with honorable service who were taken captive by enemy

forces during combat operations, or U.S. service members captured while serving with friendly forces engaged in an armed conflict. One estimate puts the number of Americans taken prisoner of war since 1917 at 142,000, the majority while serving in the Army.

Concern exists over ensuring the medal goes only to those who deserve it. Many Army records of Americans taken POW during World Wars I and II were destroyed by fire in 1973, and officials admit there might be problems authenticating requests from

those periods.

"There are alternate sources of information available," an official said. "But they're time-consuming and sometimes difficult to get to. If a former prisoner of war or next of kin can provide any evidence, that's going to be very helpful. It will make things easier for the military services to process applications, and reach determinations."

An official said the applicants will be asked to provide copies of documents proving authenticity. He said they could range from records of service confirming POW status or even an official telegram to statements by family members saying the individual was a POW.

The POW medal will be worn by persons still in uniform as the highest service medal, above the Good Conduct award. Its face depicts America's symbolic eagle surrounded by barbed wire and bayonet points, but still standing "with pride and dignity, continually on the alert for the opportunity to seize hold of beloved freedom."

On the reverse are the words "awarded to" and space for engraving the individual's name, followed by the words, "For honorable service while a prisoner of war."

Getting the medal engraved will be up to the recipient, an official







SAN ANTONIO / DEL RIO / 2nd Day / Monday

Throughout history San Antonio has lived under six flags. Learn about its colorful past this morning at the Alamo, famous for the last battle in 1836. Then visit the HemisFair Plaza, a beautifully landscaped 92-acre complex of Victorian houses, restaurants, shops and museums. It's also the site of the Institute of Texan Cultures. Have lunch at the Alsatian Inn before driving west through the Anacacho Mountains to Del Rio. This is the heart of Texas' sheep, lamb and wool producing country. HOLIDAY INN OF DEL RIO.

LANGTRY / LAJITAS / 3rd Day / Tuesday

Cross the Amistad National Recreation Area this morning and pause

Judge Roy Bean Saloon and Museum in Langtry. From 1882 to 1903 the Judge was "the only law west of the Pecos." LAJITAS / BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK 4th Day / Wednesday

Morning visit to the Lajitas Museum and Desert Garden. See wildlife and Western culture exhibits as well as historical dioramas. The Desert Garden features an excellent display of native plant life. I) rive to Big Bend National Park, an ever changing panorama of shapes shadows and beautiful desert colors. Apache legend blames Big Bend Country on someone who should know better. The Great Creator, having finished his work, took the stony material left over and threw it in a heap. As you enter the park the Chisos Mountains rise so sharply they look as if God dumped them on the desert. Stop at the

Mule Ears, Burro Mesa and Sotol Vista overlook areas for great panoramas. Continue into the Chisos Mountains Basin, elevation 5,600 feet, for lunch at the Chisos Mountain Lodge. Then stop at the Panther Junction Visitors Center to learn more about this area. This is the land of the Commanche and Apache Indians, remote and over 1,100 square miles (nearly the size of Rhode Island). Three distinct areas comprise Big Bend ... river, desert, mountains ... three parks in one. Return to Lajitas and the OFFICERS' QUARTERS.

RIO GRANDE FLOAT TRIP / 5th Day / Thursday

Drive west this morning and begin year Rio Grande Boat trip miles of mild water thowing through iven dible gorges. Purple lava cliffs provide a striking contrast with the multicolored volcanic ash formations. Have lunch ashore and take a canyon hike on the Mexican side to see a variety of plants and geology. Return to Lajitas and

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

How to Make Reservations. Please see the back cover for the easy 6 steps on how to make reservations and get ready for your tour.

Reservation Deposit. Your reservation is confirmed upon receipt of your deposit at Maupintour. Please include the \$35 per person Tour Cancellation Protection fee with your deposit for full refund availability (see the next section). The reservation deposit required per person is due 7 days after you book your tour. A reservation is withdrawn if a deposit has not been received 8 days after a booking unless an extension has been requested and approved. Final Payment. The balance of the land tour rate is due 6 weeks before departure.

Cancellations/Refunds. You'll receive a full refund on cancellations 60 days or more before departure date, less any out-of-pocket costs. For cancellations received fewer than 60 days before departure date, a \$30 per person fee is charged regardless of the reason for cancellation. For cancellations received 42 days or fewer before departure date, the \$30 fee is charged plus a service fee not exceeding 10% of the land tour rate plus any nonrefundable expenses incurred for hotels, carriers or ground contractors, or other out-of-pocket expenses. No refunds are possible for unused portions of a tour unless arrangements are made before departure. If you must return home, refunds will be whatever net funds Maupintour recovers from contractors. If any tour must be withdrawn, Maupintour's liability is limited to refund of monies received. Cruise ship, airline and other transportation penalties are subject to rules of carriers. Hotels. Accommodations are in the hotels listed in the itineraries, or best available alternate should circumstances beyond Maupintour's control demand, based upon two people sharing a twin bedroom with private facilities.

Single Rooms. A limited number of single rooms is available at the supplement shown for each tour. While single rooms provide privacy they are often smaller than twin bedrooms and sometimes poorly located, especially in the older hotels.

Share Room. If you are traveling alone but prefer to share with another, we will try to work out congenial rooming arrangements. If a single room must be assigned due to your roommate's cancelling or incompatibility or for any other reason (even if at the last moment or while on tour), we must of necessity charge you the supplement or pro rate thereof since the hotels make no allowances.

Triple rooms are available in most places for family or friends traveling together. However, we discourage triple room accommodations because they are normally not spacious. Triple rooms usually are merely a regular twin bed or double room with a cot or roll-away bed added. Understandably, this makes the room crowded.

Meals. All or most meals are included, as shown for each program. Breakfasts, with few exceptions, are your choice. You can have a fuil American style breakfast, or if you have a light appetite you can have the Continental style. It is your choice, a special Maupintour feature. If an early departure is scheduled from your hotel, sometimes a full American breakfast may not be available. Lunches and dinners are usually from a preplanned menu offering a choice of two or three entrees (almost always a choice between fish, chicken or meat). Some meals are a la carte. Specialties of each region are featured at special lunch and dinner parties.

Coffee or tea is included with all tour meals. You'll not be bothered by waiters for extra payment, another special Maupintour feature.

Dessert is included with all lunches and dinners, another of our special features.


Surface Travel. Transportation on tour is by modern air-conditioned motorcoach (not owned or controlled by Maupintour).

Luggage. Handling of one piece of normal sized luggage per person for tours up to 10 days long and two pieces of normal sized luggage per person for longer tours is included. If you bring an extra overnight case or flight bag you must care for it yourself. Be sure to have luggage insurance.

Transfers. All transfers for tour events are included.

Tipping. All expected tipping is included to luggage porters, bellmen, doormen, sightseeing guides and dining room waiters. You don't need to worry or bother. The traditional end-of-trip gratuities to your tour manager and driver are not included. If you feel they helped you enjoy your Maupintour, we suggest you enclose gratuities in envelopes and present them individually at the end of the tour (rather than passing a hat).

NOT INCLUDED

Air Transportation. The land tour rate does not include any air transportation. Please see your travel agent for flight reservation and airline tickets.

Arrival/Departure Transfers. Since tour members will arrive and depart at different times, we can't arrange a group transfer from the airport to the hotel and from the hotel to the airport. Taxi, limousine and motorcoach transfer services are available at nominal cost.



If substitutions are at a lowe cost, a refund will be made when you return home. During local o national holidays certain features such as museums, sightseeing tours and shopping may be limited or unavailable. In such instances an whenever possible itinerary adjustments and substitutions are made to minimize inconvenience. However, if your enjoyment might b diminished by such limitations, we invite you to check with the pertinent state tourist office, your travel agent or with Maupintou before selecting a tour date. Several guidebooks have information on museum and holiday closings.

The responsibility of Maupintour (a Kansas corporation headquar tered in Lawrence, Kansas) and/or its agents or cooperative cosponsors of its tours is limited. They act only in the capacity as an agent for the passenger in all matters connected with hotel and dining services, sightseeing tours and other suppliers of services, and transportation whether by rail, air, motorcoach, car, boat or by any other means. As agent, Maupintour holds itself free of responsibility for any damage, injury or loss resulting from any cause. We cannot be



responsible for any extra costs or losses resulting from any damage, expense or inconvenience caused by delayed or cancelled transportation services, changes of schedule, strikes or other conditions beyond Maupintour's control. Maupintour neither owns nor operates any of the suppliers of services. All suppliers of services are independent of Maupintour. Maupintour is neither responsible nor liable for actions or defaults of those not directly under our control.

If any tour must be withdrawn prior to beginning tour date, Maupintour's liability is limited to a refund of monies received by us.

Carriers are not to be held responsible for any act, omission or event during the time passengers are not on board their conveyances. The passenger contract in use by the carriers, when issued, shall constitute the sole contract between carriers and purchasers of these tours and/or passengers. Any airline may be flown.
