Joe let his personal room serve as the Hospitality Room(he came in on the short end of sleeping that night). Bill helped arrange for some liquid refreshments and also put up some signs to direct traffic to Joe's room.

Tuesday Sept 15.... Several of our group were driven to the Clark County Courthouse to be present to the reading of a Proclamation declaring Sept 15, 1998 as a **DAY OF REMEMBERANCE FOR OFLAG 64**. When the Oflag 64 group was introduced to the audience they were given a standing ovation. **Albert Cecil** was given a birthday party with a **HUGE** cake. We ate on it for 2 days!

Wednesday Sept. 16...Lunch was our first meal together in the Hotel. After lunch a trip to the Stratosphere Tower was enjoyed by the group.

Thursday Sept 17... A business meting was held during breakfast at the hotel. Alan Dunbar conducted the meeting with remarks by Bob Thompson and Joe Seringer. Alan introduced Bob Thompson who presented Abe Baum with a collection of letters thanking him for what he and his men did on that day in Mar 27 and 28, 1945 at Hammelburg, Germany. Bill Warthen read a letter from Harold Cohen to Abe Baum describing their friendship during and since WW II. Abe Baum then recounted his life in the military and more particularly the acivities of "TASK FORCE BAUM" in March 1945.

It was announced during the meeting that **Sid Thal** would be unable to host the reunion in **1999 Pat Waters** stood up and announced that he and Martha would host the reunion in 1999 at Charleston, SC.

Herm Littman also announced that he would host the reunion in 2001 at Coeur d'Alene, a resort about 30 miles east of Spokane.

Duanne Kennedy is making arrangements for the 2000 reunion in Loffland, NV.

The evening was spent at our dinner/ dance arranged by Alan.

Friday Sept. 18, 1998... A memorial service was held at the hotel and conducted by a Chaplain from Ellis Air Force Base. At the conclusion of the memorial services everybody was saying "goodbye and 'we'll see you in Charleston".

There were two of our men that made remarks about the reunion that should be repeated here:

Roy Chappelle: It has been a most eventful summer with a terrific OFLAG 64 Reunion at Las Vegas. Although our numbers are shrinking (naturally) the poignancy and sweetness each time(particularly enhanced by the very loyal widows and the inclusion of POW offspring) is totally rewarding.

Bill Warthen: My regret is that I did not get to talk to many whom I have known in the past. There is never enough time, and we go through the "pleasantries", then there ias an interruption and you pass on to others, and go through the same basic conversation

These remarks seem to sum up the thoughts of most of us and surely they represent what most of feel about it.

WHEREAS, On September 15, 1998 former prisoners of War from Oflag 64 will reunite in Las Vegas for their annual event to continue the friendships and special bonds made during their service in the war. Having served as prisoners of war, this special group of servicemen share a deep appreciation for life's simple pleasures denied them in captivity: a decent meal, a warm room, a bed with more than 3 slats, and even an occasional martin; and

WREREAS, the "Kreigies" of Oflag 64 (Kriegsgefangener: who have gone on to lead productive and important lives after the war, including: major newspaper editors, Broadway show producers, major radio and news show staff, White House, Washington D.C. staff, high ranking officials within the Veterans Administration, and achieving high military ranks; and

NCW, THEREFORE, WE the Board of Commissioners of Clark County, Nevada, do hereby recognize these brave soldiers for their service and sacrifice for our nation during a time of great need, and proclaim September 15, 1998 as a Day of Remembrance for



Pfc Clarence W. Boyd, one of the soldiers in the 'Task Force Baum' unit was killed in action on March 27, 1945, during the raid on the Hammelburg Camp. His daughter, Joan Boyd Handtke of Schererville. Indiana wrote the following letter to Time Magazine. The letter appeared in the August 17,1998 issue and is as follows:

SEEING PRIVATE RYAN

Nice try, Spielberg! You think perhaps we can bring back the deep pride we once felt in our own flag with a mere movie? Pride is a reflection of doing the right thing and doing it well. When was the last time the decision makers of the U.S. deserved that feeling? Our government has always "asked" the sons and daughters of this country to uphood the values we believe in. What the government hasn't done is keep its end of the bargain, by placing a value on the "ves of its servicemen and women. Weeks before the end of World War II in Europe, our government "asked" its soldiers to take part in a dubious mission to rescue an American prisoner in Germany, the relative of an influential general. The prisoner made it home. My father, Private Clarence Boyd did not.

From J Handtke

Just wanted to tell you I read thru the magazine you sent. What a great job they did putting it together. Yes I did enjoy it because It gave me an opportunity to visualize where my Dad was and what he saw on the last day of his life. My Mom and I both have always wondered and now can at least have some idea. Her and I both have always hoped he wasn't one of the men who was crushed by our own tanks. We would like to know he wasn't, and then again would not like to know if he was.

There is another book about the battle called "48 Hours to Hammelburg by Charles White that is out of print. His estimate of casualities of the task force is much higher than the 25 in the magazine. His rationale is they started out with 307 (this differs from the 294 in Raid). If you subtract the handful of Baum's men and POW's that escaped about 20, subtract the 25 killed (9 in action and 16 never accounted for) and subtract the 100 extra prisoners that Cen Goekel recalled that he had after the attack. The total number left unaccounted for is 149 cr. 162 (depending on whose number you start with). That would mean the total probably killed is beween 174-187. According to White's book the casualty reports did not list the number of POW's killed. I wonder how they explained away these soldiers? At least with my father we knew that he was killed. I wonder how many other families never knew?

My mother notice if that I said my dad was a PVT when he was a PFC so I got twenty lashes for that! She wasn't happy that I had not told more of the story. I was lucky to get it in the magazine at all, but I think she expected more than was possible.

I want to thank you for your thoughtfulness in sending me the collection of letters of the prisoners that were compiled for Abe Baum. I have read them all and the thought I had was...... my father at least helped to give these men the exhilaration of freedom if only for a very short time and then perhaps the hope that the Americans were most likely going to send in a larger force to free them. I have never thought of that before as I was focused on the free one prisoner mindset. You have all given me a larger perspective that I did not have before.

This is the account of a trip to Schubin in October of this year by Bret Job, one of our Guest Editors. Bret is the son in-law of Ray Holmquist.

We have safely arrived home from our trip. We went to Oflag 64 and it is a bit run down, much more so than it was 14 years ago when I was there last. The White House is close and the city has deemed it a his torical site and is looking for a buyer to fix it up. If they do not, it will be demolished. There is only one barracks building inside the camp's till standing and it will be torn down sometime in the near future. There are also barracks which are just outside the main gate. The barracks were used for the Germans I think. They will also be torn down soon. The chapel is being worked on but they have not had such progress.

We also went to the farm you all marched to the first day, Vegheim. This is where Ray stayed and Boo went on the barns they were in were still there and is currently being used for a construction company. The farm house is completely run down on the inside. It has also been deemed an historical site which means they can not change the outside but the inside can be altered. Strange. The entire farm is almost to the point of ruins. The farm where Ray and Boo were has been taken care better than the house. The ground are also a mess. It is a sharre that the house in such terrible shape. They were working on a room inside the house. The inside of the house had change so it did not look like Ray had remember it. He stayed there for about 3 weeks before going Odessa. We had a Polish interpreter with us who was a opera singer and musician. She told us that the opera House in Bydgozoz will be finished soon. It had been started about 30 YEARS ago. So things take a long time to develop and complete.

It was very interesting because we went into Poland with two German rental cars. In Szubin, we were stared at Indeven given a very ugly stares by the people. Especially by an elderly Polixh woman. She stood on the opmer and firsts tared at out license plates and then her face got real ugly. I decide then if I was going to get anywhere witht the polish people, we needed to get away from our cars.

We also went to Nice, France. We found the exact spot Boo was captured in the Isola, France area. It was way up in the mountains and in a very beautiful area. The German pillboxes were still there and the old foot trail that boo was on was still there. The only people we saw were a couple of shepards who use the bunkers and cillboxes for the sheep and one of the shepards even uses the old German bunker quarters to live in when it rains.

We were able to meet with a man who run a little museum in Szubin and was around in 1944-45. He built some of the barracks and also assisted some of the non-American pre 1943 officer escape with false papers and such had quite a bit of documentation. He also help an Dane and the Dane wrote a book about it. I do not have the name of the book but I can get it if you want. Not sure if it is in English but I ordered it because I can read banish as I went to school in Denmark for several years. I'm not sure if the name of the book translates exactly English. He also had another man come over who was a little boy who lived on the Vegheim farm as a little sy, about 10 years old. The farm house was next to one row of the barns. He had I believe seven older is sters and he remembers the POW's who had stayed back when the remaining POW's marched out the second by. It was interesting.

nyway, we had a wonderful time. I have to go. Talk to you soon.

In 19 months, The National D-Day Museum will open in New Orleans, Louisiana. The new museum honors contributions of the men and women of the United States Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard and Merchant Marines to all the D-Day invasions of World War II—in North Africa, Italy, Normandy, and throughout the Pacific Theater (starting with Guadalcanal and extending through Okinawa). The Museum is located in New Orleans because it was here that Andrew Jackson Higgins designed and built the LCVPs and other landing craft that carried men ashore on all these D-Days.

The National D-Day Museum will be housed in a building on Magazine Street, located near the Convention Center and in the middle of a group of museums (the Contemporary Arts Center, The Ogden Museum of Southern Art, the Confederate Museum, and the Louisiana Children's Museum).

The Museum is actively collecting artifacts and documents from the soldiers, sailors and airmen of World War II for use in the new Museum.

Chermayeff & Geismar Inc./MetaForm Inc. of New York, the designers of the Museum, have won many awards for their museum creations—the best known is the Ellis Island immigration Museum. If you have visited Ellis Island, you know how rich the Museum is in artifacts brought from overseas to the United States—baby shoes, a family Bible, photographs, a wedding dress, tools, pieces of furniture. What makes them compelling is the individual story attached to each artifact: whose shoes and how they got to America, a family Bible, recording births and deaths in a particular family, etc.

The designers want to do something similar in The National D-Day Museum and are now seeking artifacts and documents that carry a story. For example, a helmet in perfect shape, even if made in 1944, is less valuable to the designers than a helmet with a hole in it and a story to go with it. Another example: one of our prized possessions is Wally Parr's red beret. Wally was with Major John Howard at Pegasus Bridge on D-Day in Normandy, then on to other action, ending up in Palestine in 1945.

Obviously this approach can be used with almost any artifact---a ring, boots and uniforms and clothing of every sort, a radio, a Bible, diaries, letters, photographs, rations, containers; jerricans, rifles, knives and every other kind of weapon, books (especially comic books or the paperbacks distributed among the troops), maps, field notes, French, German, Italian, and Japanese souvenirs, ammo boxes, and much more.

If you would like to donate an item or two to The National D-Day Museum we are anxious to hear from you. Please do not send us any artifacts, but instead send us a letter describing any items you wish to donate. We will then follow-up with a letter or phone call if we can use your items. Please be advised also that as a matter of policy The National D-Day Museum does not accept

loans, either temporary or permanent and that all donations to the Museum must come in the form of an unconditional gift. Please send your letter to:

If at all possible please send along a snapshot of the item, If there is a story attached to the item, tell us about it. Again, please do not send any artifacts at this time.

Please do not limit your contributions to artifacts alone. An important part of The National D-Day Museum will be the ongoing archives, maintained by the Eisenhower Center. We hope you will consider donating to the archives your oral histories. There they will be available to scholars one hundred years from now, and beyond.

The opening date for The National D-Day Museum is set for June 6, 2000. It is going to be a wonderful museum and we very much hope that you will be a part of it.

We are not asking for your money. We want something far more valuable—a part of your life. Although obviously we cannot promise that your artifact or document will be displayed in the opening exhibit, we can promise that it will be professionally preserved and available to scholars and families in future years.

As Chairman Emeritus of The National D-Day Museum, I ask you to join us in this important endeavor. This project is dosest to my heart. It is going to be the living memorial to the men and women of the Armed Forces of the United States in World War!—men and women who changed the twentieth century from one of darkness to one of light. 
