Hello Eileen and Abe.

I hope you both doing fine. We just want to inform you that we had a great performance on 26 March 2005 in Gemünden. About 900 people came to see the film about the liberation of Gemünden and Hammelburg by the 14th Armored Division. Martin and me showed the powerpoint presentation (you had seen in in Minneapolis). Some people came and told us their experience about the Raid. So we still in a process to iterview this people.

Dr. Jim Sudmeier was also there and he was overwhelmed by the event. The interest of the people and their friendlyness was unbelieval.

Our cooperation Partner the Film-Photo-Ton Museumsverein will produce a video in NTSC format with English spoken narration. When it is produced we would like to send you a copy. **Do you prefer a** video tape or a DVD? Please send a short note that the people can produce you the corresponding material.

Our next event will be our participtation at the Bonnland Fesitivity on 18th & 19th June 2005. We will exhibit original vehicles and weapons (e. g. Sherman, Hetzer,), show again the movie. We can't believe how fascinating the people are about Task Force Baum and the Hammelburg Raid. We expect about 30,000 visitors at this weekend. If we can produce a video about the Bonnland Festivity, we shall send you one as well.

We shall end the year with another fine event. We plan to drive the route of Task Force Baum from Aschaffenburg to Hammelburg in original vehicles (about 9 Jeeps). We have cotact to some people who collect Jeeps. So we plan to do our Raid on 22nd & 23rd of October. The first day will go from Aschaffenburg to Gemünden and the second day will go from Gemünden to Hammelburg. If shall organize that we can use the original route - even the nowadays forbidden roads. I hope also that we shall have a original US half-track vehicle on the tour. Martin and me plan to do stops and explain on spot what happenened during your Raid. We have information that the Bavarian TV and the local press will join us. During our stop at Gemünden in the ancient Huttenschloss, we shall show the movie again for those who havent seen it yet and have a Powerpoint presentation about the raid.

We whish that you could come. But we fully understand that a people's age brings limitations. I begin to understand what this mean, when the doctors set me a pacemaker last year.

So stay well!

We met a lot of people who want us to tell you greetings. The list is to long to name them all. Yoy met a lot of them during yout tour in 2003 to Germany. I promised them to tell you their "Hello and Hi" when I contact you the next time.

I sent this message some time back to Bill Warthen and others, but want to be sure you received a copy.

I plan to be in Hammelburg on June 18 & 19 for the event that Peter has described in earlier e-mails. My friend, the gal who helped me take care of Don for almost a year, Charlene, will be traveling with me.

We leave Michigan on May 27 to visit a few of Don's distant cousins in England. We will join a tour group in London on June 3rd that will go to the beaches at Normandy, the site of the Battle of the Bulge, Gen. Patton's grave, Cologne, etc. The tour ends in Berlin, but Charlene and I will stay on and take a train to Hammelburg. We're very much looking forward to this trip. If at all possible, I might also like to follow the route of the march taken in the winter of 1945. If we do that, I would try to find a local car and driver who could help us.

I hope this finds you and Gladys well. We are all fine here in Livonia. It's been a long winter, but spring arrives tomorrow. Hooray! This area of Michigan, alone, had about 80 inches of snow this winter. About twice our average. It came in big bunches at a time-12 inches, 6 in., 8 in., etc. Beautiful, but rather a nuisance.

I'm looking forward to the reunion this year. I'll be getting a left shoulder replacement in July, but expect to be in top shape for the reunion. The doctor said I have no cartilage left in that joint. Bone on bone. Pain almost constant, but I keep on doing what I want. I'm sure there are a lot of other stories out there in our group that are better than this one.

Take good care of yourselves.

Dear Bob,

I appreciate the fact that you continue to remember Irv Yarock in your masthead. Indeed, he was a "good friend" to all of us at Offing 64. I was having a bit of a problem convincing the analyst processing my application for combat related special compensation (CRSC) that life as a POW was not "good for your health" as the old cigarette ad warned. To add weight to my assertion, I asked Irv to write me a letter, which would support my claim. He wrote right back, forthrightly and vividly. I enclosed his letter with my application and have no doubt it helped get it approved. Here is a copy of Irv's letter. I thought you might like to include it in your next ITEM as a sort of tribute and remembrance to a great guy.

Dear George:

I'm sure June 6th is one of the dates indelibly marked in your mental calendar. I remember June 6th 1944 in Oflag 64, but the date also sent me reminiscing. Except for the psychological shock of being captured and the feeling of shame, the nagging kept at me until I saw Colonel Drake at Oflag 64 when he said "you know you can't be captured unless you're close enough to be killed".

In looking back, I think the toughest part of my in-carceration was our 360 mile hike from Schubin, Poland to Parchim, Germany. As I recall, the rumor was that we were going by train. However, when we got out on the road we As usual, food was kept hiking in the cold and snow. scarce, but what I hated most was the evening. We would be packed together, immoble, while someone (I never knew who was in charge) was negtiating for a place to sleep. We were too tired to march in place, and we all ended up with frozen feet. I think it was twice we stayed in a barn where the animal heat warmed the building, but most of the time we slept in unheated churches. It was just as cold inside as outside, but at least we were out of the wind. I had two blankets that I folded into a sleep-I would climb in with all my hiking clothes on. ing bag. After a few hours I generated enough heat into the bag to unlace my boots, which I had to keep inside for security reasons but also if they were outside they would be too stiff to put on in the morning. I don't know how many stiff to put on in the morning. times I went to sleep praying that I not wake up. At one point the column passed a Russian soldier by the side of the road, frozen stiff, and I'd hate to guess how many people in the column were thinking "why couldn't that be me?" Sometimes, if the person you're talking to has trouble understanding, if you say our march was the time of the Battle of the Bulge, everyone seems to know about the foul weather at that time.

Well, George, I know you had the same experience. What did "D Day" make you think about?


Ethel 'Sally' Millett age 90, passed on Tuesday, March 8, 2005 in San Antonio, TX. She was born in Bible Grove, Missouri on February 19, 1915. Sally was the 10th of 13 children.

She graduated from nursing school in San Diego and was an Army Nurse in the Philippines when WWII began.

Sally was one of 86 Angels of Bataan and was captured and held as a POW for over 30 months. She received numerous decorations including a Bronze Star.

Upon reassignment to Florida, Capt. Blaine met her future husband, Col. Millett, a commander of a Paratroop Regiment during the Normandy Invasion and also a POW in Germany. Col. Millett was a military Attaché in Beirut,

Lebanon and Ammon, Jordon where Sally assisted him with the diplomatic community for the US government until her husband's death in 1955.



Sally was a member of numerous military service organizations including the American Legion, VFW and Defenders of Bataan and Corregidor. She was honored and recognized on numerous occasions by the Army Nurse Corps. Sally will be sadly missed by her family and friends.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Col George V. Millett, Jr.

Sally is survived by sons, George V. Millett, III, DDS and wife, Ann of San Antonio, TX and William M. Millett and wife, Marisa of Clinton, MD; step daughter, Nancy V. Clarence R. Meltesen, Lt Col USA Ret, died Saturday, 7 May 2005 in San Francisco, CA. He was 88 years old.

He is survived by wife, Mary Helena Briggs Meltesen at home; three daughters, Anne C. Trujillo of Santa Rosa, CA, Gayle T. Meltesen of Camas, WA, and Lynne A. Meltesen of Lakewood, CO; a son, Jay H. Col Meltesen combined an Army career with ten years of teaching science in the San Francisco secondary schools. He then wrote and published three books on WWII ground forces officer POWs, their forced marches in 1945 Europe and Darby Ranger escape and evasion after their battle at Cisterna, Italy on 30 January 1944.

He was a member of CNPS, California Native Plant Society; CRTA, California Retired Teachers Association; TROA, The Retired Officers Association; The Sierra Club; DAV, Disabled American Veterans; The Commonwealth Club of California; San Francisco Civil War Round Table; AXPOW, American Ex-Prisoners of War; MOWW, the Military Order of the World Wars; MOPH, Military Order of the Purple Heart.

The family will arrange cremation and a private memorial service locally with subsequent inumment in Arlington National Cemetery at 10 AM on June 28, 2005. Memorial donations may be made to the American Red Cross.


