Dear Oflag 64 Family:

We are finalizing plans for the Oflag 64 reunion in Washington, D.C. from October 9-13, 2008. Hotel rooms have been reserved at the Holiday Inn, Crystal City, Virginia for \$89 per night plus tax. Please make your reservations as soon as possible so that Armed Forces Reunions can set aside additional rooms if needed. Information about the hotel is included below.

The reunion begins on Thursday, October 9. Thursday will be a free day for arrivals and registration. The hospitality room will be open throughout the reunion. Thursday's dinner is on your own. Tickets for the breakfast buffet in the hotel's 50s style restaurant will be provided for both Friday and Monday mornings. On Saturday and Sunday mornings, the full breakfast buffet is available for \$10.99.

The Business Meeting is scheduled for Friday from 9-11 am and we are hoping that the White House visit comes through for Friday afternoon. If you are a Kriegy who plans to visit the White House and have not yet sent your full name, date of birth & social security number to me, please do so as soon as possible (Kriegies only). My contact information is included below. If you wait to do this until you arrive in Washington, it will be too late. White House volunteers will help with wheel chairs, but wheel chairs are not provided by the White House. Friday's lunch and dinner are on your own.

On Saturday, we will have breakfast on our own, (available for \$10.99 in the hotel), then board buses for the city of Washington tour. We will stop for lunch downtown and also at the World War II Memorial. Dinner is on your own. Tour descriptions are included below.

On Sunday, the breakfast buffet is again available in the hotel restaurant for \$10.99. There will be an optional tour of Arlington National Cemetery after a stop at a food court for lunch. Sunday's banquet will be at the Holiday Inn beginning with a cash bar at 6pm.

Monday's buffet breakfast (tickets provided) will be in the hotel's restaurant from 7am to 8:30. The Memorial Service begins at 8:30 am.

There will be opportunities for those who wish to visit Washington's tourist sites on their own. The closest metro stop to the hotel is "Crystal City" on the blue line. If you wish to visit Arlington National Cemetery on your own, the metro stop is "Arlington National Cemetery" also on the blue line. The 23rd Street "Restaurant Row in Crystal City is a short walk (crossing a very busy street), cab ride, or shuttle ride from the hotel.

Crystal City is across the Potomac River from the District, and most museums, monuments, and federal buildings are only a few minutes away. Parking in Washington is next to impossible, so plan to take metro or a cab. The Smithsonian metro stop is only a 13-minute ride from the Crystal City metro stop on the blue line. The elderly and disabled travel for half price.

My family and I are looking forward to a great reunion in Washington. If I can answer any questions, please feel free to contact me. (e-mail is best).

TOUR DESCRIPTIONS

WHITE HOUSE TOUR

Friday, October 10

This is still deep in the planning stages, but our hope is to embark on a special tour of the White House, focusing mainly on the West Wing. We're aiming for a Friday afternoon tour, but details will be determined after the cut-off date. **NOTE: This tour is only open to POWs.**

CITY TOUR

Saturday, October 11

See the sites of our nation's capital during a driving tour of Washington, D.C. Ride by the Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, WWII Memorial, the Mall, Capitol Building, Washington Monument, White House, and other notable monuments and federal buildings. Free time will be allowed at the National World War II Memorial, the first national memorial dedicated to all who served during World War II. Afterward, stop at the Ronald Reagan Building and International Trade Center, which is the largest building (3.1 million square feet) in Washington, DC and is the first and only federal building dedicated to both government and private use. While there, enjoy lunch on your own at the Reagan Building food court - named one of the "best family food courts" in DC.

10:00am board bus, 3:00pm back at the hotel

Price for bus and guide is included in the reunion package. Lunch is on your own.

ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY

Sunday, October 12

Before heading to Arlington National Cemetery, we'll stop for a quick bite to eat at the Pentagon City Food Court. The tour of the Cemetery will be aboard Park Service Trams. Ride by Arlington House, home of General and Mrs. Robert E. Lee. The 1,000 acres of the cemetery were once part of the Lee Estate. Visit the Tomb of the Unknowns where you will see the changing of the guard, and then visit the gravesites of President and Mrs. John F. Kennedy and his brother Robert, lit by the eternal flame.

12:15pm board bus, 4:15pm back at the hotel \$36/Person includes bus, escort, and tram. Lunch on your own.

Driver and guide gratuities are not included in the tour prices. Please plan to be at the bus boarding area at least five minutes prior to scheduled time.

extreme weather where we were all wrapped up with everything we could find, with little exposed except our eyes. You did not absorb the backgrounds of each other. Then there were probably 300 who managed to escape the first few days, then another large number were moved at two different times by box cars to Lukenwalde, and other smaller groups followed that I was not aware of until recently. It took me many years to trace and establish contact with some of my closest comrades on the march. I learned of the ITEM and Reunions in early 1982. Then Dottie and I attended our first reunion, which was on Miami Beach, (an easy decision to make for us because Kathy lived in Coral

Gables, and we wanted to see our little grandsons). There we met several other couples who were also 'first timers', and the Reunion veterans made us feel so welcome, and I was able to report our recent trip to Southern Germany, our visit to Hammelburg, the considerate German Officer Host who spent a good bit of time hearing of my experiences and sharing a sly visit to their small and secret German Infantry Museum that included their weapons, uniforms, motor cycles, pictures, maps and records, but not a single swastika. From there Dottie and I went on to Nurenburg, where we had been held after the RAID. After a week we took our SPRING march, with over 1000 Air-Corps Kriegies who had been held at Luft 3, Sagan, until the Russians came. We knew we were only months or weeks away from liberation. Our guards were young German Luftwaffe trainees who were very casual in their duties. It was Spring and on clear days we could see the Alps. Red Cross trucks started meeting our column, cellars were full of potatoes, hens were laying eggs, and the dairy barns were available. It was nothing like our 45 days in northern Poland and Germany." Thanks, Bill, for your compliments on the ITEM. Thanks also for sharing more of your experiences. We enjoy hearing them and appreciate the sacrifices that each Kriegy made during that difficult time. Please write again.

LILLIAN WRIGHT from Catonsville MD (widow of William E. Wright, Jr.) sent an email a while back stating: "Just received the "Item" and immediately sat down and read it through. Dear Mr. Williams:

Our last letter from Curtis was written on Christmas Day, and he seemed in high spirits. The Red Cross had given all the prisoners a parcel, containing among other things a can of Turkey and a Plum Pudding. A day or two before Christmas he had received a food parcel we sent in August and seven letters. He said that there was plenty to eat for everyone on Christmas Day. Curtis has been a prisoner for two years and was at Oflag 64 since October 1943.

We received a picture of him taken about a year ago, and he looked well and strong. This week we received a letter from First Lieut. Laurence B. Higgins - 600 S. 14th Street - Clarinda, Iowa, who was repatriated from Oflag 64 on January fifth and returned on the Gripsholm. He said that Curtis was in good health and high spirits. Oflag 64 was, without doubt, one of the best Prison Camps.

Since January 21st, when the boys were moved, we have heard nothing but both Mrs. Jones and I believe that Curtis will make the best of his lot, and we hope that all the boys will be liberated soon. Our two younger sons are with the Seventh Army in France. The Seventh liberated a large number of U. S. Prisoners on March fifth. If we hear any further news that we think will interest you, we will send it along.

Mr. Thompson,

I noticed you are assisting editor in the Oflag 64 site. Last year I met a former POW held in Oflag 64. He contacted frostbite on the journey from the Battle if the Bulge to the camp.

I submitted a request for the Purple Heart for wounds incurred while in captivity. According to Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, and 3 May 1944 severe frostbite is included in the definition of a wound.

The initial recognition was not until Public Law 104-106, dated February 10, 1996 was approved for wounded POWs held prior to 25 April 1962.

Since former AAF personnel came under the jurisdiction of the AF in 1957, the Board for Correction of Military Records is approving requests for the Purple Heart to former POWs that contacted frostbite during forced marches early 1945.

However, the Army Board is denying requests to former ground troops that experienced identical wounds.

If interested, I can provide copies of letters from the Army, conclusions from the AF Board , Army Board, and a 5-page letter of legal opinion by a Colonel, USAFR, Retired, former JAG officer, currently a local civilian attorney.

There is no reason for this injustice to continue. Please take interest in the quest to see these former POWs receive what was earned so many years ago. Regards.

Dear Oflag 64 Veterans, Families, and Friends,

Thank you so much for your responses to our original inquiry a few weeks back. We highly appreciate the information and enthusiasm everyone has shown, and we really apologize for the excessive delay in responding to many of you.

We are now 100% "greenlit" by National Geographic Channel to produce a documentary about the recently declassified "MIS-X" World War II program, which communicated with and sent hidden escape and evasion materials to "Kriegies" in all 60-plus prison camps. Many of those interviewed in the Robert Galloway film spoke indirectly about MIS-X without mentioning it by name.

As I mentioned in my original message, we are especially interested in the story we've heard about P.O.W.s at Oflag-64 who requested a large shipment of escape aids in April or May of 1944. I have attached our original source of the story, a chapter taken from Lloyd Shoemaker's 1991 book, "The Escape Factory." I thought that maybe quickly reading the chapter might stir the memory of some of you

and possibly lead to some interesting additional details.

Of course, any stories of escape, evasion and coded communication would also be great to hear about. Any photographs or footage records that tie into the World War II P.O.W. story would also be great to know of.

Lewis W. Lowe 1917 – 2008



Lewis W. Lowe, was born August 10, 1917 on the farm of his parents, Charlie Clark and Katie Blanche (Ramsey) Lowe, n the then Hay Capital of the World, Gilbert, Arizona, albeit with a population of about 1/10th of 1 percent

of what it is today. He passed away Saturday morning, April 19, 2008. He, along with his three younger sisters, Lucille (Lowe) Coppedge, deceased, Mildred (Lowe) Kasitz, deceased, and Velma (Lowe) Walker, of Stanfield/Casa Grande, attended the old Gilbert Grade School, now the cornerstone of the Gilbert Historical Museum, and the adjacent Gilbert High School, where he played football. At the urging of one of his teachers, Lewis attended the University of Arizona during the Great Depression, notwithstanding the failure of the Bank of Gilbert where his dad had deposited the proceeds

from the alfalfa, cotton, and corn crops that Lewis helped to plant and harvest during his childhood and adolescence with the help of horse drawn teams and later mechanized farm equipment, a tractor of which is at the Gilbert Historical Museum. Lewis participated in ROTC while earning his electrical engineering degree at the U of A. Following graduation and Pearl Harbor, Lewis entered the U.S. Army as a Second Lieutenant, responsible for repairing radio communications between tanks. He participated in the North Africa invasion in November of 1942, a costly learning experience for Dwight Eisenhower and others, but paving the way for the subsequently successful June, 1944, D-Day Invasion of Normandy. Unfortunately, as Lewis described it, on December 2, 1942, he became a guest of the

Germans for the next 2 1/2 years, being moved from the tip of Italy, through Germany, and ultimately to Oflag 64 in Poland. Oflag 64 resembled in many respects Stalag Luft III depicted in the



Steve McQueen movie "The Great Escape", including unsuccessful escape tunneling shored up with bunk bed slats, and surreptitious dirt dispersal through pant legs. Liberation finally came after a grueling 48 day march of over 360 miles on severely limited food in sub-zero snow and ice starting at the end of January, 1945. Beginning at over 1300 prisoners, Lewis numbered in the less than one-half who finished the march, accompanied by the Germans retreating from the Russian advance. Toward the very end of the march General Patton, in his only decision during the WWII he later regretted, had one of his officers launch an ill-fated attempt to rescue the Oflag 64 prisoners, including then Colonel John Waters, son-in-law of Patton. Shortly after returning from WWII, a friend introduced him to a student nurse at Good Samaritan Hospital, Janet Vondracek, who was training to be a cadet nurse in WWII and who happened, coincidentally, to be the first female born at Good Sam, at the time birthing shifted from home to hospital. They fell in love, marrying in November, 1946, and remaining in love for over 61 years. He and Janet had four children: Linda Lowe, Nancy (married to Ralph Lusby), Charlie Lowe and Joyce (married to Richard Kurashige). And he was a dad for Gerlinde Krissel, a foreign exchange student at Washington High for the 1965-66 school year. Lewis worked for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation in Phoenix as an electrical engineer for some thirty years, helping bring the Bureau's hydro-electric power to the ever expanding Valley, in particular from Lake Mohave's Davis Dam, as well as supervising maintenance of power lines from Davis Dam. Lake Mead's Hoover Dam and Lake Havasu's Parker Dam all on the Colorado River and construction of the Pinnacle Peak power substation. In addition to his wife and four

children, he is survived by his sister Velma Walker and six grand children (Rachel Lusby, Mark Lusby (married to Brooke), Sarah Lusby, Ben Lusby, Ian Kurashige, and Jennifer Kurashige). Lewis, a quiet, humble, exceedingly self-less man, is and will forever be sorely missed by his family who loved and admired him for his patience, his wonderful dry wit, and most importantly wisdom. They all look forward to being re-united with him as a result of his and their faith in Jesus Christ. A funeral service will be conducted at 10:30 a.m., Saturday morning, April 26, 2008, at the A. L. Moore-Grimshaw Mortuary at 710 W. Bethany Home Road, Phoenix, Arizona. Ellen W. Bryan 1904–1998

We have received word that Ellen Bryan (94), widow of Wright Bryan passed away a few years back. If anyone has additional information regarding the date of her passing or an obituary, please send it to Elodie Caldwell at either address on the front page of this ITEM.

Helen Chappell sent the following:

We were close to Wright and Ellen years ago and spent time in their home in Clemson, So. Carolina when Wright was President of that University. Ellen was a close friend of Margaret Mitchell who wrote, "Gone With The Wind".

Ellen and Wright were so active in the early years of our Reunions.

Bill Warthen added this information about Ellen and her husband, Wright:

Ellen Bryan was our honoree at the Atlanta Reunion in 1995 that my family and I led. She was in her early 90's at the time, and was delighted to participate, came to two or three of our parties, My Ellen would pick her up at her apartment on Peachtree Street, very close to Lenox Square.

Wright was a war correspondent for the Atlanta Journal, very tall, 6'8 and very handsome and very friendly. He had scooped the world on the D-Day Invasion, by conning his way on to a C-47 that was flying paratroopers to Normandy in the middle of the night before the landing early that morning. When he returned about daylight on June 6th, he got to a phone and called Atlanta to tell them the Invasion

was on, and what he had done to witness the beginning.

Just weeks later, evidently while taking further chances, he was wounded in his leg and was captured. I think his treatment as a prisoner was just as if he had been in uniform, and was sent to the Berlin area, hospitalized and operated on by a German Surgeon. This would have been in July, probably, and he didn't make it to Schubin until much later, probably early in November.

I arrived at Schubin at 23:00 Christmas Eve, and we were greeted warmly the next morning. Everyone wanted news about the war, and 'back home", and someone learned I had gone to the Citadel, and they told me there was a fellow in the hospital who had recently arrived who had gone there, and his name was Jack Monaghan. That was my college roommate whom I had not seen in over 2 years, so I dashed over to surprise him. He had also been wounded and treated along with Wright, and they had become very close friends while at the hospital and had traveled to Oflag together, and were bunked right next to each other. I visited almost every day and became friends with Wright because of our interests in things Georgia .

He told me he had three children, two daughters, and a son who was about 2 years old. They came to Vidalia in 1948 to speak to a Kiwanis Lady's night and I met Ellen at a cocktail party afterwards and everyone enjoyed both of them.

In a few years they moved to Cleveland, he was Editor of the major Cleveland paper. I discovered Ellen and Wright's Son, even taller than his father at 6'9, who worked in a prominent bookstore in Atlanta. We became friends whom I always visited when in Atlanta. Ellen Bryan died in about 1999.

We invited their son and their two daughters to the Reunion we sponsored at Columbus, GA in about 2002 or 2003. The younger daughter came for the last two days

and brought her little boy, who got lots of attention.

Ellen was daughter of a former mayor of Atlanta and the Family were very prominent. The son died about two years ago, soon after retiring from Borders. He died of cancer only two months after retirement.

Helen and Roy were very close friends of the Bryans, traveled with them back to Schubin only a few years after the war.

Louanna Matthews Casner 1921 - 2008

In her younger days, she played bridge, golf and tennis. Every weekend for several years, she rode horses in Rock Creek Park on the bridle trails with her husband and daughter.

<u>Survivors include her husband of 65 years, Al</u> <u>Casner of Falls Church</u>; her daughter, Judy Fletcher of Woodbridge; and two grandsons.

Remembrances of LEWIS LOWE

The following remembrances are from Lewis Lowe's children and were read by Lew's son Charlie at his funeral.

LINDA

1. Helping Dad solder resistors, capacitors, and transistors onto circuit boards in the early 60's as he built a HeathKit stereo amplifier and tuner. And later when he helped her and her friend Barbara Bernstein build transistor radios for their freshman year science project at Washington High.

NANCY

1. Nancy remembers when she caught the measles when she was 10 years old. It was during the summer, and she could hear all of the kids in the neighborhood outside playing. Dad would come home after work and read her fairy tales from her favorite books.

CHARLIE – A couple of his favorite memories are:

- 1. Dad helping to build Charlie a tree house in the back yard's big Mulberry tree, with a rope ladder that could be pulled up to prevent access by sisters if needed.
- 2. Building a gasoline-powered go cart that Charlie steered with his feet and had endless fun with.

JOYCE

1. Joyce remembers the time, she was about 20, when Dad took her with him on a job. He often used the Bureau of Reclamation's helicopter to monitor electric power lines, find where problems were and drop crews in remote areas to repair.

On this one occasion, Joyce rode along. At one point they landed inside a big construction company yard. Apparently it took a lot of the people in the construction yard by surprise, and they came over to look at the helicopter and see what was going on. Dad and his colleagues got out and went over to talk to a group of curious, while Joyce was standing next to the helicopter with the pilot. The people in the yard wanted to know who Joyce was, and so with a straight face, Dad said she was his and the other men's supervisor, all of whom were more than twice her age. The people looked at her in incredulous amazement.

When Dad and Joyce were reminiscing in the Hospital about this incident during his last hospital stay at St. Josephs, it still brought a smile to his mouth and a twinkle to his eye.

Dad was generous with his time and skills. He would help those less fortunate. An elderly widow at church, a neighbor on the street where we lived, wherever he saw a need.

He was a gentle man and a gentleman. Notwithstanding all of the pain and discomfort Dad experienced in the last few weeks of his life, mostly in the hospital, when the myriad of different doctors asked him - "How do you feel, Mr. Lowe" he would say - "With my hands".

Whenever the nurses would wake him up to take his blood pressure and temperature, or poke him day and night to get some more blood for tests, he would say with quiet sincerity, "Thank you".

Dad, you were always kind, supportive, patient, compassionate, and wise.

You never needed to say much. Your actions spoke much louder than words ever could of how you loved us.

You were the best Dad we could ever have had.

We miss you so very much, and will treasure dearly our memories of you.

Thank you, Dad, for everything. We love you.

Your kids.
