Richard Baron (Hammelburg Kriegy and coauthor of the book "RAID") posed a question to other Kriegies: "How did we heat water? Our meals were brought in from a kitchen. I have no idea of it's location, but that's not the question. The Yugoslavs in the next compound made coffee. I went into their compound a few times, using a hole in the latrine wall. I was usually given a cup of their wonderful coffee, so they had heat. When we were with the British, they made tea. Usually on Sundays. I know they heated a barrel of water for that purpose. I don't want to describe the method here, but, I know there was a source of the necessary heat, and that's what I need to know." In a subsequent email he stated: "I wrote a précis of our recipe, using our waste barrels, which were used at night, when we were locked in the barrack,

unable to go out to the latrine." Once we sent the query to our Oflag 64 Family, Jimmie Kanaya quickly responded and brought everything back to Richard's remembrance. *Thanks Richard for your emails and for pursuing the answer to your question. We're happy to hear that Jimmie had the answer for you. We're curious as to what the answer was.*

Eleanor Bertrand (Oflag 64 family member living in Baton Rouge LA), after receiving an email from Pat Waters, called to chat about preliminary planning of a reunion in NOLA later this year. We had a

great chat, brainstormed many ideas, discussed possible contacts, then sent the results of our chat to Pat in a follow-up email. Pat is reviewing notes, and survey results to come up with just the right "plan" for a reunion. *Eleanor, thanks for the phone call and for your emails and for doing the preliminary leg work for a NOLA Reunion. We're happy that the reunion is now a reality. Excitement is high amongst those who have given us a positive response.*



T. J. Bugg III (son of Kriegy Thomas J. Bugg Jr.) wrote in response to Richard Baron's query about heating water beginning with information about his dad. "Dad is currently 2 months short of being 95 years old Charlottesville Virginia

and lives in Charlottesville, Virginia.

He was indeed a prisoner @ Oflag 64 Szubin, Poland and was one of those who marched that ill-fated journey from January 20th 1945 throughout Germany with the other ~1,500 officers and one of those (along with two other men marching with him) that were of the ~400 who made it to the end in Moosburg, Germany. He was also one who was briefly (2 days) liberated by Patton's direction to Abe Baum in Hammelburg, Germany "Task Force Baum" and then immediately recaptured. I asked Dad how did they "Heat Water" and he shared that at Oflag 64 that was basically done by the Germans for their food, however they would have a very small amount of heat in the barracks and some did heat water on them. Not very much available there.

Dad went on to share that while they were on the march that they would stop at night and start fires (they had matches) using wood from the woodpiles they found along the way as most families along the way would have woodpiles stacked near their homes. All of their heated water and food was cooked over the fire they made from the wood they got from the woodpiles. They had a little sled they pulled along with their cooking tools. Any food that they were able to have and cook came from their "scavenging" from fields they passed through or other means to have anything to eat. Dad loves to tell the story that one of his three other officers was the "scrounger", Dad was the cook and the third guy was the "complainer"!! If they were fortunate, they would find a barn to sleep in overnight and as it was so brutally cold Dad would try to find a cow to sleep next to for heat, but if not the guys slept three abreast with a cover over them and the outside guy shifted to the inside each hour to keep from freezing." Thank you, T.J., for sharing this information. It's so hard to comprehend just what our Kriegies had to endure during their POW days, but we're endlessly grateful for their unselfish service and sacrifice. They were and are truly great Kriegy heroes and patriots.

Frances Marks Buck (daughter of the late Kriegy Frederick Smith Marks) has been searching for information about her father and his connections to a Polish family following the war. We contacted Mariusz Winiecki for suggestions since he is familiar with the area and many of its residents. At this point without more clues, we have been unable to help. We're hoping for a "miracle". *Frances, it's been a while since we've corresponded but it was good to hear from you again. We're sorry that we've been unable to assist you with information so far. Never give up. It's out there somewhere.*



Steven Burgauer (author and Oflag 64 family member) wrote in response to Richard Baron's request for information about heating water. From William Frodsham's notes, he recalled that in the barracks candles

were used, animal fat melted down. *Thank you, Steven, very much for responding so quickly to the request for information. It's interesting to read all the different ways heat was generated throughout the various POW camps during WWII.*

Susanna Connaughton (daughter of the late



Kriegy Seymour Robert Bolten) recently found our website and asked to be added to our email list. She also stated that she would be taking a trip to Szubin in

late January to visit the site of Oflag 64 and asked for directions. In an email after her trip, she reported "I had a fascinating visit to Szubin with Mariusz.....My father and his family kept all of the letters that they exchanged during the war, so I have been sorting through all of them. There are also some great exchanges between my grandparents and Leo Fisher; and between my father and his former choir director at NYU who helped to send sheet music to the Oflag 64 choir.....In going through this trunk, I've also come upon a cartoon/map drawn by Billy Bingham, illustrating the battle at Sidi Bou Zid".....She added that she will be scanning her dad's photos and letters from his time at Oflag 64 and would be very happy to share with the Association when it's pulled together. Susanna, thank you for contacting us and welcome to our Oflag 64 Family. We are thrilled that you had such a nice visit in Szubin. Many of our Oflag 64 Kriegies were also at Hammelburg.



Mark Evans and his dad, Warren "Bing" Evans (Kriegy) sent a nice note not long ago with Bing's address change information, with thanks to

Doug O'Dell (Major General, USMC-Ret. and Oflag 64 family member) contacted us recently with information about his father and also a proposal for a future reunion. He wrote: "My father, Captain Douglas

V. O'Dell, Sr. was a Hammelburg "Kriegy" having been captured on the Belgian-German border in December, 1944. He was present for the Baum raid, and subsequently lost his leg while the POWs were being marched toward Bavaria in mid-April. Happily, he survived another 40 years. He was also at Walter Reed with John Waters for almost 16 months.

The reason for my note is a modest proposal. I am on the Board of the Freedoms Foundation www.freedomsfoundation.org located at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. We were founded by Dwight Eisenhower and E F Hutton in 1949 with the mission of educating Americans on the rights and responsibilities of citizenship. Our 72 acre campus, immediately adjacent to the National Historic Site, has meeting space, dining facilities, and dormitories which can hold up to 200 persons. A short trip from the Philadelphia airport and all of the historic sites, museums, and other attractions in and around Philadelphia, it might be an ideal locale for an Oflag 64 reunion. We would be delighted to host such an event, and the Fall in suburban Philly is a great time of year.

Even if you decided to do it this year at Valley Forge, since we host large groups of students and teachers, as well as veterans groups from all over the country for our various education programs, we have our system in place to manage this on a turnkey basis. Very little effort on your end. I would also propose to ask Valley Forge Military Academy to provide volunteer "aides de camp" to help the Kreigies and their families to get around.

Let me know if this would be of interest to you, all of the Kreigies and their families. General O'Dell, we remember you from our previous New Orleans reunion and thank you for facilitating some of the events at the WWII Museum. Thank you also for sharing information about your father and recommending a future reunion at the Valley Forge facility. What a great idea! That possibility will definitely be a topic of discussion soon, as we know decisions need to be made quickly.



John Rodgers (Kriegy) keeps in contact with us on a regular basis and recently wrote: "This may seem a little strange to you, but I think that my time as a POW was not a total

loss. For one thing I made a few lasting friends there. Another thing is a matter of health. I know none of us thought we had enough to eat, but during that period we didn't put on weight either. After being on that long trek from Szubin to Moosburg and return to US control, I weighed in at 134 pounds....I consider that my relative good health today is partially a result of losing a lot of weight during a period of life when it's easy to gain weight....Also as I recall, there were four of us who were from the Air Force. First was Willie Higgins who was captured in North Africa. The rest of us, James Sparkman, Wm. Korber and myself were from the 27th lt. Bomb Gp. in Sicily. Sparky was later transferred to one of the German air force camps, Stalag Luft 1 likely. Among what we used to refer to as ground pounders were those other airborne troops known as paratroopers. Among them was Herman Littman, Lou Otterbein and Harry E. Evans. Harry and I became the best of friends and when we returned to the States he arranged for me to have a blind date with him, his sister Faye and his lady friend. That night I asked Faye to marry me. This was June 5, 1945 and we tied the knot the following July 29th. We

were wed for 62 years until she passed away on July 1, 2007....In spite of all the recent bad publicity, I want to put in a good word for the Veterans Administration. I began losing my hearing about 30 years ago. Since then the VA has kept me among the hearing with hearing aids. I am totally deaf now and the VA has equipped me with a Cochlear Implant. Now I hear even better than I did with the old aids." Lastly, he responded to the guery about heating water saying: "In Oflag 64 the kitchen was in either a basement or a lower floor. I never went there myself but understand our one meal per day was prepared there. We had a Lt. Col. whose name I don't recall, served as our mess officer and oversaw the preparation of our food. On the upper floor we had one of those tile stoves that was common in Germany in those days. It was fueled with a kind of brick (not coal) that I think was something like peat. Fuel was limited so we didn't waste it just to heat water. Some of us had small heaters made from tin cans fueled by wood shavings which we used to heat a cup of water for coffee powder from Red Cross package. I wasn't in Hammelburg long enough to see how water was heated." John, it's always good to hear from you. Thanks for sharing your thoughts and information about fellow Kriegies and days as a POW. We never tire of hearing of experiences and life events. Thanks also for sharing your VA experience with us. It's unfortunate when a few "bad apples" spoil things for so many. Thank goodness for the "good apples". Glad your experience was a positive one.



Ted Roggen (Kriegy) wrote to compliment us on the inclusion of his escape stories in the last ITEM. He also shared "I recommend New Orleans as a great place for our

reunion. NO is a premier convention city." His recommendations were passed on to Pat Waters. We'll see what happens in the near future. Separately, Ted sent a lovely gift of almond toffee petites/milk chocolates. *Ted, it* was good to hear from you again. People are looking for other people through press, TV or internet by telling original stories and I believe the response sometimes happens. Maybe there is hope. So, I believe that sending of unique ad with the story to Polish national daily paper, may be a good way to start."....Regarding the "possible Szubin trip" that didn't come to fruition. Mariusz wrote: I'm sad that the traveling of a group of visitors won't be possible this year. I was so excited and I have expected this will happen anyway. I believe that I will meet some of the 'Oflag 64 Travel Respondents' in Szubin soon as they will decide to travel as individuals. I understand that the expense of such travel is a huge factor. Timing is always the same problem when one wants to coordinate a lot of people. Maybe simplifying the

route of traveling would be more effective. I understand that most of you would prefer to visit all of the places where you fathers were fighting WWII and were captured, then durina imprisoned, etc., but maybe you can remove some places from the "wanted to see' list ... Traveling to Poland and optionally to Germany might be cheaper....And lastly, Mariusz has discovered that a small group of Americans arrived at Oflag 64 in October 1942, 6-8 months prior to what current records show. If any living Kriegies or family members of deceased Kriegies know more about these early months, or of prisoners arriving in early May 1943 instead of June 1943, please contact us. Thanks, once again, Mariusz for all you do. You are invaluable to us and we appreciate all your efforts and information. Please be sure to thank your family for sharing you with us also.

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The following is from an email sent to members of our Oflag 64 family who have email addresses, and relates to a missing Nazi Flag Heirloom.

The family of the late Kriegy Ernest "Snap" Ankrom is in need of our help

Please read the following portions of an interview with Snap's daughter, Sandy Ankrom Williams, contained in an article written by Holly Zachariah from The Columbus Dispatch. It's entitled **Nazi flag** heirloom missing from Pickaway County veterans office - Flag became an unlikely symbol of endurance for POWs, and was published online on Monday, January 26.

Holly wrote: "But while going through some old things nearly 20 years ago, Sandy pulled a Nazi swastika flag from a long-forgotten box. It had been tucked away in a closet for decades, and she had never even known it existed. It was big — probably more than 3 feet wide and 2 feet tall — with its bold red barely faded and its gold fringe unfrayed. What stood out, though, were the signatures. Maybe as many as two dozen men had scribbled their names, ranks and hometowns on the fabric.


She asked her dad about it, and he told her part of his story.

As an officer and an infantry-unit commander, he had the duty to try to keep these POWs safe, to shield them as much as he could from the dangers thrown their way. And to show their gratitude, when liberated somewhere in the Germany countryside at the end of the war, the men had ripped down that

flag, signed it and presented it to Ankrom.

"That flag stood for the struggle that my dad and all those men — those heroes — had gone through," Williams said. "It's our history."

As you have probably guessed from the title of the article, the flag is now missing. Snap's family and Holly are interested in learning the names of the men who signed the missing flag and if any are still living, they would like to find these men. This "still" photo was taken as a screen shot from the video link about the missing Nazi Flag Heirloom. If you are able to decipher any of the signatures or are one of the signatories, please contact me, Elodie, at the email address on the front page.

The paragraphs below describe the meeting between Susanna Connaughton and Mariusz Winiecki in January of this year. Photos follow.

The meeting with Susanna was really exciting. I was not able to remember before her arrival who her father (Seymour Bolten) actually was during the camp days, but when we were chatting, it appeared that I already knew his story quite well.

We have started at the Railway Station (now abandoned), where every POW arriving to Szubin has visited. On the wall of the water tower, which is very close to collapse, because it is in ruin, the name "Altburgund" can be still visible behind the name "Szubin". In the next step we have spontaneously visited the Municipal Council of Szubin, to shake hands with the Mayor of Szubin. Szubin celebrates this year the jubilee - 650th Anniversary of Granting of the Town Privileges in 1365. On the first photo below, from left to right is Agnes (the friend and the supporting interpreter), the vice-mayor of Szubin, Susanna, the secretary of Municipal Council and myself. After that we went to the Szubin Museum, to see the permanent exhibitions about history of Szubin, camp and the presentation about the camp history. The rest of time we have spent in the Reform School. We had a walk around all the buildings, which were inside the barbed wire fence: The White House, the appell area, the chapel, the hospital and the barracks. We also saw the almost ready scale model of the camp. The last hour we spent in the office of the Director of the Reform School. This part was a treat for me, because Susanna showed us some of her father's memorabilia from the camp. She has also donated to me an original issue of The Oflag 64 Item - the first number (November 1943) - Susanna's father together with Ken Goddard and Frank Diggs every month used to go to the Szubin Center to the Printing House. The printing house does not exist anymore, and we were only able to see the land where it was. The weather was on our side.



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Last August, Cindy and Glenn Burgess took a trip to Szubin to visit the site of Oflag 64. They had a wonderful visit and upon returning, they wrote the following commentary of their trip.

Commentary of trip to Szubin, Poland Cindy and Glenn Burgess (Daughter and son-in-law of Kriegy Wilbur Sharpe) August 2013

Almost two years ago our family made contact with Dr. Mariusz Winiecki, a resident of Szubin, Poland, through a letter written to Wilbur Sharpe (my father) inquiring about Oflag 64. Dad, at first, was overwhelmed with the number of questions posed to him in the letter and was puzzled as to why there was interest in his incarceration at Oflag 64. We began the process, as father and daughter, to answer Mariusz' questions via e-mail and Skype sessions, and through this effort we understood the intense interest of Mariusz regarding Oflag 64.

Mariusz, as a young boy, passed the site of Oflag 64 on his way to school and often wondered about the history of the location. As he became an adult and an accomplished academic, he pursued his curiosity by inquiring within his community and subsequently searched and found the Oflag 64 website. Through this website, he was able to acquire information on the surviving Kriegies and thus began sending letters to a number of the survivors.

As a result of this connection with Mariusz, we have learned a great deal about life in the prison camp. Mariusz' passion for learning as much as possible regarding Oflag 64 and sharing his findings with the community is commendable. The Kriegies and families of the Kriegies owe a debt of gratitude to Mariusz. He has not only tapped the memories of my father, in particular, but has enlightened our family to life in Szubin over 70 years ago. Our interest in seeing Szubin was piqued and we planned our trip to

see as much of Poland as possible. We, of course, arranged our trip around Mariusz' university schedule as our primary focus was to visit Szubin and learn as much as possible.

Our trip began in Gdansk, Poland, continued to Bydgoscz, Szubin, and Warsaw and ended in Krakow. Of course our stay in Szubin was emotional, memorable and enlightening. We were greeted at the abandoned train station where the Kriegies arrived via Bydgoscz. We met the Principal of the Reform School, Wiesław Guziński, which is located on the site of the Oflag 64 prison camp (and the exact grounds of the location of the Little Theater) and were given quite a thorough tour of the grounds. We also met Tomasz Kmieć, the instructor to the young men, who designed and erected the scale model of the camp. Mariusz asked a good friend, Agnieszka Jakiełek, to accompany us as an interpreter. What a delightful woman. We enjoyed her company but Mariusz speaks beautiful English!

In 1942, as a Corporal he was sent to A.F. Officer Candidate School, Fort Knox, Kentucky, and appointed a 2nd Lt. He received a field promotion in Infantry, Company A, 756th Tank Battalion to 1st Lt just before he was captured in southern France. Then Captain in 1945. He joined the reserves after the war, and when he passed away in 1969, he was a Major."

Herndon Inge, Jr. 1920 ~ 2014



Herndon Inge, Jr ("Wank") age 94, a well respected and distinguished Mobile attorney and judge, WW II veteran member of the Greatest Generation, died peacefully December 17, 2014.

Inge was a wise counselor, principled, irreproachable, and a bright light who touched countless people from all walks of life during his career. He was preceded in death by his parents, Margaret Erwin Inge and Herndon Inge, Sr.; his wife of 49 years and mother of his three sons, Eleanor Unger Inge; his sisters, Imogen and Molly; and three brothers, Zeb, Sam and John. He is survived by his beloved wife. Alice Williams Inge, three sons, David U. Inge (Katherine KD Wright), Herndon Inge, III (Amanda Hunter), and George B. Inge (Jane Carter); and his brother, Coleman (Jean) Also eight grandchildren; Katherine Hinson (Alex); Richard Inge (Ann); David Inge (Mindy); Eleanor Baker (Stephen) Elizabeth Ridgdell (Josh); Virginia Inge; Edward Inge (Marisa) and Caroline McDonald (Will) and 12 great grandchildren.

Inge was born on March 4, 1920 in Chickasaw, Alabama the third of seven children. During the Great Depression, he dropped out of Murphy High School to help support his family. He returned to his education later and worked his way through Spring Hill College and the University of Alabama majoring in commerce and business administration. He was a member of the Delta Kappa Epsilon Fraternity.

During World War II he was an Infantry lieutenant and platoon leader in the 94th Infantry Division in General George Patton's famous Third Army and participated in the Normandy,

Brittany, Andennes, and Central Europe campaigns. He was captured during the Battle of the Bulge and spent three months as a



German prisoner of War. Inge was awarded the Combat Infantry Badge, Purple Heart, and Bronze Star.

After World War II he completed his education at the University of Alabama Law School. He returned to Mobile and was appointed Juvenile Court Judge, a position he held for 17 years. He was later elected circuit court judge in domestic relations and was president of the Young Lawyers and the Mobile Bar Association. Inge founded the legal aid program in Mobile County and was appointed by President John F. Kennedy to the Youth Crime Commission and appointed by Gov. George Wallace to Alabama State Library Board where he served as chairman. Inge retired from the bench after practicing law until he was 88 years old. In 2009 he was awarded supernumerary iudae in Mobile County.

He wrote a book, ORSCHOLZ BARRIER, his account of his experiences in World War II, written in the 1950's but not published until 2013. In 2007 he was celebrated in the highly acclaimed Ken Burns WW II documentary also honoring other heroes from Mobile.

Inge was a member of numerous civic clubs, and several mystic societies, and a long time member of St. Paul' s Episcopal Church. We are so grateful for the love and devotion of his caregivers, Mary Gray, Sharoka Stadmire, and Blanche Taylor. Inge was a model father and had a very strong work ethic that he imparted to his three sons. Yet, above all of his professional, personal, and civic accomplishments, Inge was the most proud of his three boys and the men they have become.

Known as, "Granddad" to his grand and great-grand children he was our beloved patriarch and a man of exemplary character. He was a born optimist, always positive and soft spoken with a smile on his face. He brought joy to each of us through the years by his kindness, sweetness and very gentle nature. Our whole extended family is so grateful for his life, for his service to our country, and for his life long example of honesty, fair-mindedness, humility and graciousness. While his physical presence will be greatly missed, he leaves for all of us an incredibly honorable legacy. He was our hero.
