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

- <u>Bill Bell</u>, son of the late Kriegy Frank W. Bell wrote to ask if anyone has information about his dad's captivity after he was marched out of Oflag 64; he's not on Hammelburg or Luckenwalde rosters. (See photo in the Kriegy News and Information section)
- **Richard Brooks**, grandson of the late Kriegy John Terrence Maguire wrote with information about his grandfather's life and POW experiences and asked to be added to our email list
- Vicki Frodsham Brown, daughter of the late Kriegy William Frodsham, Jr. wrote that she has her dad's memoirs and some files of people he remembered; she referenced the book written about him "The Road to War: Duty & Drill, Courage & Capture" and about a contact she's had with David Little (on our research team) who would like to write her dad's bio



This photo of the late Kriegy Frank W. Bell was sent by his son, Bill Bell. Bill wrote: "My dad was Frank W. Bell. He was a 2nd Lt. in Company A of the 398th Infantry Division. He was captured in Wingen Sur Moder, France, on 3 December 1944. He spent his initial captivity at Stalag XII-A and was then sent to Oflag 64 arriving there on or about 31 December 1944. His name is listed in the database of Oflag 64 prisoners.

I've attached a letter he sent to my grandmother on 7 January 1945. I've included the address side of the letter showing he sent it from Oflag 64. I haven't been able to find out much about my Dad's captivity after he was marched out of Oflag 64. I believe he was among those who were marched to Hammelburg, but I'm not completely sure of that. He rarely talked about that portion of his life. My Dad passed away on May 7, 2005.



## **Kriegy Bios, Artifacts, Artifact Descriptions**

We're happy to include the following family-written bio in this issue of the ITEM. It was written and submitted by David Glendinning, son of the late Kriegy John Glendinning. Photos are from family files and Google Images.

## John Andrew Glendinning, POW 1500

John Andrew Glendinning (known variously as Jack or Glen) was born 10 January 1922 in Elizabeth, New Jersey. He was a twin to sister Elizabeth, younger brother to Richard, Jr., and son to Richard E. and Alice M. Glendinning (nee Summers). John's father was a brick mason by training and operated a building company in Elizabeth; his Mother was a housewife.

At age 9, John entered Howe Military School, Howe, Indiana, from which he graduated in 1940, having been Captain of the basketball team, a varsity football player, and where he excelled at track and gymnastics and was a senior cadet leader. Following graduation from Howe, John attended Rollins College in Winter Park, Florida but left following his sophomore year to join the Army after the nations' declaration of war in December 1941. Based on his Howe ROTC training, John was commissioned a 2d Lieutenant and trained as an Armor Officer. On 18 August 1942, he shipped out for England with the 805<sup>th</sup> Tank Destroyer Battalion (TDB) and spent the next three months training with what he described as his "WWI-era" weaponry.

On 1 January 1943, Lt. Glendinning and the 805<sup>th</sup> TDB departed Glasgow, Scotland in a convoy aboard the Dutch merchant vessel Alcinous for Algiers where they were to await combat orders. As their convoy

traversed the Mediterranean, closing to the Algerian coast, they were attacked by German submarines and the Luftwaffe, sinking one of the ships and leaving others damaged and with casualties. The Alcinous was untouched but for John and most, it was their first taste of the

war. On landing in Algiers on 17 January, the 805<sup>th</sup> was attached to Allied Force HO pending







assignment, which came as orders to the front and they departed for Tunisia on 8 February 1943, attached to the 2d Corps Reserve. Lt. Glendinning was designated C.O. of 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon, Co. A, 805<sup>th</sup> TDB. On 14 February, the German's Afrika Korps launched an intense offensive against the Allied line and Lt. Glendinning and the 805<sup>th</sup> were ordered to move out against the 10<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Panzer Divisions in support of the United States' 168<sup>th</sup> Infantry, 3d Battalion, which

had become trapped in the fighting. John and Co. A were then redeployed to support the attack on Sidi Bou Zid, attempting to protect the US left flank. John's call sign was Charlie One Baker and over the following days, he and his four-halftrack unit, as well

as the whole of the 805<sup>th</sup>, were engaged in heavy fighting, taking severe losses against the superior firepower of the German tanks and Luftwaffe air bombardment. On 17 February, as the Allied forces were ordered to retreat, Lt. Glendinning and the members of his platoon were among the last line to hold back the fast-advancing Afrika Korps at Kasserine Pass and with his mobile gunships having been immobilized or destroyed, he and his remaining men were hiding in scrub bushes about 2 miles northeast of Sbeitla when they were discovered and captured by German Infantry.

Following is a section of the official 805<sup>th</sup> TDB report of operations for the period.

Corpany "A", 805th Tank Destroyor Estalion, with one Beconnaissance Flatoon was detached from the battalion on 14 Pebruary 1943 and sent to SERTIA. It took up successive positions east of the town as part of a force under command of a Colonel Herma. Two platoons were detached from the com-pany and compled independent positions south and east of SHOTHA under other commanders. Un 16 February 1943 company withdrew to west under energy pressure along with resaining American forces in front of and behind it. On 17 February 1943 it reverted back to the battalion at KASSERINE.

The thousands of US military prisoners of war taken in the Battle of Kasserine Pass, including Lt. Glendinning, were sent first to Naples, Italy for processing. There, a Vatican representative took names and sent official notification to servicemembers' families.

John's mother Alice received notification from the Vatican that her son was in German custody at the same time the Army was listing him as Missing in Action, such was the intelligence capability and organization on the ground for those remaining after the German assault. On 5 March, Lt. Glendinning was moved from the internment base at Capua, Italy into Germany, arriving at Stalag 7A, Moosburg and then, on 13 March at Oflag IX A/Z, Rotenburg where he remained until 7 May when he was moved, with some 300 other ground officers from the North African campaign, finally to Oflag 21B, later designated as Oflag 64, in John's POW ID photo Szubin, occupied Poland.



During the ensuing 19-plus months at Oflag 64, John formed lifelong friendships with fellow "Kriegies" and was active in arranged and pickup sports but found a calling in "The Little Theater," a home-grown enterprise involving scores of his fellow captives who



wrote, directed, staged, and performed in concerts, plays, extravaganzas, and similar entertaining distractions on a self-built stage with instruments provided by the Swedish YMCA and costumes pulled together from discarded fabric.

On 21 January 1945, in the face of advancing Soviet forces, the Germans moved the men of Oflag 64 out and toward Germany, Lt. Glendinning among them. They carried what they could in packs and rolled blankets through the deepening Polish winter,

trudging through the incessant snows and sleeping with animals in barns along the way or in huddled groups to maintain warmth. On occasion, friendly Pole risked their lives to slip the prisoners a scrap of bread. On 23 January, many of their guards fled, though were quickly replaced by an SS detachment. By the 26<sup>th</sup>, nearly frozen and without even their meager POW rations for sustenance, the sick among them were transferred to boxcars, each holding 50 men, and moved without water for days toward Berlin. Whichever, or combination, was his fate<sup>1</sup>, Lt. Glendinning ended his journey 700 km later at Stalag 3A, Luckenwalde, in late February 1945, there to await the end of the war.

In his diary, John noted a visit to the camp while there by the famous boxer, Max Schmeling, who had served in the German Luftwaffe. Liberation of a sort came on 21-22 April, when the Russians entered camp but no release was offered until US forces arrived in May. On 6 May, 1945, nearly 27 months after capture, Lt. Glendinning left Stalag 3A with others on trucks through Germany and then by ship, arriving home through New York on 3 June 1945.

Throughout the rest of his life, John stayed active with reunions and events involving his Oflag 64 brothers, even helping organize a special fund-raiser in 1966 in support of fellow Oflag 64 POW Tom Finan, who was running for re-election as Attorney General of Maryland.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Diary entries are unclear whether Dad was shipped by boxcar or marched on. His two diaries suggest different paths; in one, he passed out from weakness and was put on the train while the other provides a daily log of continuing the march with the larger group. It is more likely he marched as, in his "Wartime Log" book he drew a map of what he called "Travels of a Child at Arms", which included everything from departing Glasgow through the march and ending at Stalag 3A, whereas medical evacuees were supposedly transferred elsewhere.

Following the war, John enjoyed some R&R, completed his Reserve service, and got back to life, putting to use his new love of the stage, broadened by his Oflag 64 Little Theater experiences. Soon after he returned from German captivity, John auditioned for and joined the USO in New York, and was soon thereafter shipped back to Germany and Italy as an actor entertaining (again) the troops. He played supporting and starring roles

in a variety of road shows, taking time aside to visit sites such as Hitler's Eagles Nest and Hermann Goering's house (both in ruins), and attending a session of the Nuremberg Tribunal. Returning to the United States in late 1946 to build on his acting career, John settled in New York and, in April 1947, married a USO touring colleague, actress Celia Lorraine Pressler. In between jobs that paid the rent, John and Lorraine continued seeking opportunities in the theater, radio, and film. In addition to some industrial films, public relations assignments, and car shows around the country, among other not-so-glamorous roles, in 1948 John grabbed the part of a reporter in the film The Babe Ruth Story and in 1949 was playing on Broadway in Metropole. That year he also appeared as a Naval investigator in the film

Lost Boundaries, with Mel Ferrer, winner of the Cannes Film Festival. He entered the

1950's in television roles, playing in It Takes a Thief and The Big Story, both at NBC, and on Broadway in Julius Caesar and Twentieth Century, still also working in public relations and filling in with odd jobs as salesman, including door-to-door, and waitering to keep the rent paid as he and Lorraine began raising a family. John ultimately gave up acting for a more stable occupation and a house in the suburbs, taking on the job of Executive Director for the March of Dimes in Oueens, NY. In 1961, he was named Executive Assistant to the

Chairman of the State Assembly's Ways and Means Committee, following which John held a variety of State appointments including Assistant to the NY State Superintendent of Banks. as the Deputy Industrial Commissioner, and as Secretary of the State Insurance Fund. John also devised and ran The Governor's Club for Nelson Rockefeller and was Gov. Rockefeller's party finance director in the 1970's. John Glendinning concluded his career as Director of Public Relations for

the Carrier Corporation, retiring in the early 1980's to personal projects at home in Bellerose Village, NY.

As a final legacy and tribute to his Oflag 64 brothers and all POWs, it was a comment by John in 1984 that inspired

Senator William Roth of Delaware to create the United States Prisoner of War Medal, which recognizes the sacrifices and special condition of service of all who have honorably served as American POWs. Roth introduced the bill within the year. It was passed by the Congress and, on 8 November 1985, signed into law by President Ronald Reagan. John Andrew Glendinning passed away after battling lung cancer on 3 March 1986 at age 64.


**Artifact Description**: Wartime diary of 1LT Warren E. Evans, a Canadian Y.M.C.A. "A Wartime Log" book

**Artifact History:** 1LT Warren E. Evans kept a history of his captivity and mementoes in *"A Wartime Log"* book during his internment at Oflag 64. The journal was distributed by the War Prisoner Aid of the Canadian Y.M.C.A. to POWs beginning in 1943. The American Red Cross made the journals available to American POWs.

Artifact Description: WW2 British Pill Box Escape Compass

**Artifact History:** CPT Tony B. Lumpkin concealed a WW2 British Pill Box Escape Compass from the Germans while he was interned as a POW. Lumpkin acquired this compass at Oflag 64 (according to the donor) from a "loaded" (contained escape devices) food parcel sent by MIS-X who used a fake U.S. humanitarian organization as the sender of the loaded food parcel box. The red dot indicates North and the white dot on the South point is radium paint which glowed in the dark.

Artifact Description: POW Camp Money

**Artifact History:** 1 Reichsmark POW camp money owned by LTC John Huff Van Vliet Jr. The German Government had to pay POWs who were interned in German POW camps so they printed special money for use by the POWs which could be used to purchase items from the camp canteen. Most often, the camp canteen had a very limited inventory which did not meet the needs of the POWs.

# Hugh G. Muldrow

1922 ~ 2008



Mr. Hugh Grey Muldrow, 85, died Monday, March 10, 2008, in Piedmont Medical Center in Rock Hill, SC. A graveside service will be held at 2:00 p.m. Wednesday in Chester Memorial Gardens.

Born in Mayesville, SC, Mr. Muldrow was the son of the late Robert and Mary Scott Witherspoon Muldrow.

He was a graduate of Mayesville High School and Clemson College. He retired from Chester County Government as the delinquent tax collector. He had been a first lieutenant in the

U.S. Army, serving in the European Theater, and had been a POW in Poland. He was a member of Purity Presbyterian Church, the American



Legion and the American Association of POWs. Mr. Muldrow was an avid outdoorsman who especially enjoyed hunting and fishing, and was a founding member of the Big Buck Club. He also loved time with family and friends and exchanging stories. Mr. Muldrow was first married to the late Louisa White Muldrow who died in 1981. In 1987, he married Jean Wilkes Fennell Muldrow who also preceded him in death.

Surviving are one daughter, Carlisle M. Putnam and her husband Martin of Rock Hill, SC; three stepsons, AI Fennell of Greenville, SC, Clark Fennell and his wife Kim of Rock Hill, SC, and Peter Fennell and his wife Gina of Mt. Pleasant, SC; and six grandchildren.

## Ted Roggen

1918 ~ 2022



Ted Roggen passed away peacefully on March 4, 2022, after 104 happy years.

He was born in Houston in 1918 to Hyman and Tillie Roggen. He cheated death many

times, including as a three-year-old faced with diphtheria and later as a POW—and a Jewish one, no less—in Nazi-occupied Poland.

But in between, he found his calling in public relations and advertising. He received a full athletic scholarship to Louisiana State University, where he helped manage the football team and studied journalism.

After college, he joined the Army and ultimately became a Captain. Five days after

helping the Allies invade Salerno, Italy, the Nazis captured him and kept him as a POW for nearly two years. For his heroism and courage,



he received two purple hearts and the bronze star. When reflecting on his service, the ever-witty Ted said, "I got a purple heart, a cluster, and frostbitten feet."

He later began a storied fifty-year career in public relations. After starting out with cold calls, his clients eventually included the Pappas family, Ninfa Laurenzo, and Tony Mandola. He especially loved promoting entertainers. And he warmly welcomed Ella Fitzgerald, Nat King Cole, Louis Armstrong, and the Harlem Globetrotters to town when no one else would.

Close friendships brought Ted so much joy. So did writing. The two passions led him to letters and write many two books. Above all else, Ted relished a 64-year marriage to the love of his life, Sydney-a caring, dvnamic compassionate. and soul. He is survived by his wife; a son; and grandchildren; he was predeceased by his daughter Arlene, his parents, and close friends.
