

The Flag that Inspired the National Anthem



The preserved flag resting on an angle with protective lighting at the Smithsonian National Museum of American History in Washington D.C.

On September 14, 1814, U.S. soldiers at Baltimore's Fort McHenry raised a huge American flag to celebrate a crucial victory over British forces during the War of 1812. The sight of those "broad stripes and bright stars" inspired Francis Scott Key to write a song that eventually became the United States' national anthem. Key's words gave new significance to a national symbol and started a tradition through which generations of Americans have invested the flag with their own meanings and memories.

It's always a great pleasure hearing from our Oflag 64 families. Thanks for keeping us in "your" loop and for sending information. We love reading about how and what you are doing. Please stay in touch!

<u>PAT DIFRANCESCO BENDER</u>, daughter of the late Kriegy Vincent J. "Doc" DiFrancesco – wrote asking what we knew about the book TASK FORCE BAUM written by James D. Shipman. We checked with Peter Domes in Germany, our expert on Task Force Baum. He wrote that the book is historical fiction but based on a true story with some actual names included.

<u>CINDY SHARPE BURGESS</u>, daughter of the late Kriegy Wilbur B. "Bill" Sharpe – wrote asking about how many Kriegies are still with us. To our knowledge, there are three: Robert E. Levin, Sr., Robert E. Starr, and John R. Rodgers, Sr., but there could be a few we don't know about. Additionally, she reported that she had a fabulous tour of the National D-Day Memorial in Bedford VA. She said it is a magnificent venue and beautiful memorial to our brave patriots. She encourages anyone interested in WWII to put it on their bucket list.

KEVIN DZIELECKI, grandson of the late Kriegy Stanley J. Rydzewski Jr. – wrote that he has the diary his grandfather kept while at Oflag 64. Because we have little information about his grandfather, we asked for more information. We hope to hear from him soon.

<u>PETER P. GAICH, son of the late Kriegy Peter N. Gaich</u> sent a photo of his grandfather that was sent to him by his cousin. Also in the photo is pictured Bill Cory and "Spud" Murphy. (See the Kriegy News and Information section.)

MARY EMILY KOLLER HABIG, granddaughter of the late Kriegy Francis Michael Habig – wrote to let us know that her grandfather was a resident of Oflag 64 for about 18 months and left with the evacuation march. She works in software development and has volunteered to help with our site if needed. Additionally, she may have content to add. We look forward to hearing more from her.

<u>ERIN HASTINGS</u>, granddaughter of the late Kriegy Michael J. Calpin – wrote asking for as much information as we could send about her grandfather's story. We didn't have much in our files but were able to send photos and articles about her grandfather found on Ancestry.com We knew Erin before she was married but lost contact, so it was good to hear from her again and get her updated contact information.

<u>SUSAN HILL</u>, daughter of the late Hammelburg Kriegy James H. Mills – wrote that she had recently found a number of her father's writings, including before he went to Germany as well as memories of the Battle of the Bulge and his capture. She said they were well-written accounts. She also found a transcription of an interview he did with Justin Greene, a physician who was there, and some memories of his friendship with Jack Hemingway. She was hoping to find a place to send his writings. We put her in contact with Peter Domes in Germany, who know all things about the Hammelburg.

<u>BRET JOB</u>, son-in-law of the late Kriegy Ray E. Holmquist – received a Postage Fund check from Ann Rogers for the John Waters' book. It has been deposited to the fund. (Thanks to Ann Rogers for her donation.)

<u>WARREN JONES</u>, son of the late Kriegy Charles L. Jones – wrote to catch us up on his activities, including a current cruise to Alaska with a friend who lives in Juneau. He was looking forward to seeing the highlights, mainly the Mendenhall Glacier which has receded considerably in the last 100 years.



He wrote: I visited the Iowa Gold Star Museum in Camp Dodge Iowa on Friday, and the attached picture is the new display (new to me) of Bob Eckman's Oflag 64 model. When I last visited in 2016 it was displayed on a table. The enclosed display features an 8-minute video of Bob talking about Oflag 64 and a push button panel that corresponds to building names and locations.


The museum has added many interactive exhibits such as flight simulators and an operable Navy submarine periscope, so it was nice to see Bob's model is still an important part of the museum. The library does not have a digitalized database so I could not find any specific info on Oflag 64 POWs. At the Red Oak Iowa train and military museum, I did find Chaplain Daniels book.

John H. "Jack" Van Vliet Jr (November 9, 1914 - February 5, 2000) was a career United States Army officer. He graduated from the United States Military Academy (U.S.M.A.) in 1937, fought in North Africa with II Corps (United States), and was captured during the Battle of Sidi Bou Zid on February 17, 1943. While a captive of the Germans, Van Vliet Jr and fellow POW Captain Donald B. Stewart were selected to attend the Katyn Commission investigation into the Polish officers found murdered in the Katyn Forest near Smolensk, Russia.[1] Van Vliet Jr and Stewart were U.S. Registered Code Users who sent coded messages from Oflag 64 to MIS-X in Fort Hunt^[2] New Jersey which identified the Soviets as the perpetrators of the massacre. After their liberation, they testified before the United States House Select Committee to Conduct an Investigation of the Facts, Evidence, and Circumstances of the Katyn Forest Massacre about their experiences at the Katyn Commission exhumations. Early life and education [edit]

John Huff Van Vliet Jr was born into a military family on November 9, 1914. His father, Colonel John H. Van Vliet Sr, graduated from the U.S.M.A. in 1913.

An "Army brat", Van Vliet Jr lived in multiple places including China, the Philippines, and

even at West Point during the time his father was an instructor at USMA. He was graduated from Wentworth Military Academy and was appointed to the US Military Academy Class of 1937 with a Senatorial Appointment from Kansas. As a cadet, he was a member of the track team, the swimming team and the Protestant Chapel Choir.

Career [edit]

After graduation and commissioning as a Second Lieutenant of Infantry, Van Vliet Jr served at Fort Washington MD, and then with the 27th Infantry Regiment in Hawaii.

World War II [edit]

In September 1941, Van Vliet Jr was ordered to go to the United Kingdom (UK) in civilian clothes where he observed the British Army and took specialized British Army courses. He briefly returned to Fort Benning as an instructor at the Infantry School before traveling again to the UK to take command of the 3rd Batallion of the 168th Infantry Regiment (United States) (3/168th Infantry) and lead it during the Operation Torch invasion of North



Ann Rogers, niece of the late Kriegy Frank Aten and one of our Kriegy Research Group biography writers, with Memorial Day in the US just behind us, shared the following article. We don't often think of the service our Chaplains gave to our country during the war. The article was a good reminder.

CHAPLAINS CORPS WILL OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY

The Army Chaplain's Corps, this Sunday [25 July 1945] will observe the 70th Anniversary of the founding of the corps at Fort Benning with Chaplains delivering special messages at all of the chapel services.

Of the 6 Chaplains honored with decorations presently stationed at Fort Benning, 2 served as Chaplains at Oflag 64 in Szubin, Poland:

- Chaplain Robert Hall wears the Purple Heart and Presidential Unit Citation with Oak Leaf Cluster
- Chaplain Robert M. Hennon wears the Presidential Unit Citation and a Battle Star

34 were detained by the enemy

108 were wounded in action

3 died of diseases while detained by the enemy

12 were listed as non-battle causalities

602 were awarded with 754 decorations including 15 Distinguished Service Crosses

44 were awarded Legions of Merit

104 were awarded Silver Star Medals – 3 with Oak Leaf Clusters

9 were awarded the Soldier's Medal

314 were awarded Bronze Stars – 12 with Oak Leaf Clusters

1 was awarded with an Air Medal

234 were awarded Purple Hearts – 10 with Oak Leaf Clusters


7 were awarded distinguished foreign decorations

Jean "Jeannie" M. Carlick 1937 ~ 2024



Jeannie was born in Paducah, KY, on September 29, 1937, to Horace and Rebecca Meyers. She was a graduate of Paducah Tilghman High School; received her bachelor's degree from the University of Texas

at Austin; studied at the University of Valencia, Spain; and received her master's from Murray State University.

After college, she taught Spanish, French, and Latin in high schools in Texas, Colorado, and the Louisville area. One day, while visiting her mother in Paducah, Jeannie received a prank call that

rattled her, so she called the police to report it. A local judge [the late Kriegy] named Sam Carlick, whom her family had known since she was a child, returned the call...and asked her to dinner. She returned to Paducah, married Sam, taught at Tilghman and Heath High Schools, and reared a daughter, Bethany. They lived in Paducah for many years before retiring to the Washington, DC, area to be near Bethany and her family.

Jeannie was active in the Paducah community, serving as an original violinist in the Paducah Symphony Orchestra, being elected to the school board, and volunteering with Temple Israel, among other endeavors. Music was one of her main loves, and, until the end, she held encyclopedic knowledge of the classical canon. A voracious reader, she maintained an extensive library, happy to be surrounded by her books.

Even as her eyes began to fail her, she slogged through The Washington Post and New York Times daily, always eager to talk about the latest news at weekly family dinners she hosted.

But her biggest joy was her granddaughter Samara (Sammie), her BFF with whom she had a very special bond. From the first time she held Sammie until the last time they saw each other, love and laughter (and maybe some sharp humor) radiated between them. One of Jeannie's greatest pleasures was hearing Sammie sing and lip-synching along with her (the one thing missing from her musicality was the ability to carry a tune!). Every family dinner ended with an impromptu concert, the perfect dessert for those gathered around the table.

Jeannie was generous beyond measure, and Bethany hopes to carry on her legacy of kindness and compassion, and appreciation for a good glass of wine, cheese, and chocolate. She also promises to take excellent care of – and maybe even play - Jeannie's beloved 18th-century violin.

Jeannie considered Bethany's husband Dave "more of a son than a son-in-law" and enjoyed their frequent — and maybe expletive-filled conversations about current events.

Jeannie is survived by her daughter Bethany Carlick Weinstein, son-in-law David Weinstein, granddaughter Samara Weinstein, and granddogs Quinn and Blue, all of Alexandria, VA; nephews David and Ben Carlick and niece Susan Cooper, of California; and a slew of cousins in the DC area, Paducah, and other areas of the country. She was predeceased by her parents and Sam, her beloved husband of 42 years; and many dogs, including several spoiled Scottish terriers.

Mary Louise Hoch Stewart "Mary Lou" passed away on April 8, 2024 at the age of 99.

Mary Lou was born on April 4, 1925 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

She was the second of seven children born to Monica Evelyn Fox and Louis Anthony Hoch. She fondly recounted her childhood in Wisconsin where her father was a pharmacist and her grandfather owned a cabin in the Dells. When Mary Lou was in the seventh grade, the family drove to Oregon where her father ran a youth camp as part of the Civilian Conservation Corps of President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal Program. They passed by Mount Rushmore, which was under construction. She found that she loved traveling and learning by seeing different places.

Mary Lou was gifted musically. She attended Webster College in St. Louis until her family relocated to San Antonio, Texas due to her father's military service during World War II. She transferred to Our Lady of the Lake University (OLLU) and graduated with a Bachelor's in Music in 1947. Her goal was to teach music at the elementary grade level because she was "crazy about little children." Mary Lou then became a music teacher at Ursuline Academy.

In 1948, Mary Lou married Army officer [the late Kriegy] <u>Donald Boyle Stewart</u> (Don) in the chapel at Fort Sam Houston. Their first of five children followed a year later. The children were born and raised in various locations across the US and Europe, including San Antonio, La Rochelle (France), Frankfurt (Germany), and Fort Sill

Her other interests include her devotion to the Roman Catholic faith, sewing, and needlework.

Mary Lou is survived by her children, Robert Stewart (Joan), David Stewart, Kathleen Herrera (Barney), and Barbara Stewart (Craig); 7 grandchildren, and 8 great grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her parents Monica and Louis Hoch; her husband Don; daughter Monica Bishara; brothers, Joe, John, Louis, and Robert Hoch; and her sisters, Monica Hoch and Margaret O'Brien.

Mary Lou was a woman of contrasts - soft-spoken and spirited, elegant and strong, even tough when warranted. While her journey on this earth is done, Mary Lou made an indelible mark on our lives and in our hearts. Join us in remembering and honoring her.
