Each one was applauded by the other attendees as they marched into the ballroom with their wives, one at a time. They looked so smart in their special jackets. At the end of the ceremony, they brought out the little glasses and bottle in its special wooden case and told about the promise they made so many years ago. It can be very important to get advice regarding the interplay of these benefits from an attorney who keeps up to date on both programs.

SZUBIN NEWS - Over the last few weeks, members of our Oflag 64 family have traveled to Szubin to visit the site of Oflag 64. The following photos of the visit of Anna and Sarah Weber were sent to us by Mariusz Winiecki. Look for more photos from other Szubin visits in the next ITEM.



After Anna's and Sarah's visit to Szubin, Mariusz sent the report that follows. Thank you Mariusz for your continued gracious assistance to our Oflag 64 family members in the U.S.

Hi Elodie,

It's my pleasure to report about the visit in Szubin of Anna Weber and her sister Sarah, granddaughters of late Kriege Philip M. Wade, a 1st Lieutenant in the 141st Regiment, part of the 36th Infantry Division.

On Friday, July 26th, our kind guests have visited the local museum in Szubin and have learned about the history of POW camps in Szubin including Oflag 64. They have also visited the exhibition dedicated to the WWII in Szubin. After that Anna has interviewed Mrs. Benigna Olszewska who shared with us touching war story of her family living for generations (since 17th century) in Szubin. Mrs. Olszewska was telling us how the Germans had put her family to flight and about displacements of Polish people away from Szubin when the WWII started. She was also telling about the spontaneously and neighborly organized help and how the local inhabitants of Szubin used to help to POWs during their attempts of escape from the camp.

The next stage of the tour was the visit on the camp terrains and in Reform School hosted by my friend Mieczysław Luchowski and Tomasz Kmieć. We have a special assistance from Mr. Hyży, the eye-witness of camp, and Mrs. Mariola Polańska, the local historian of Szubin. Mr. Hyży was the priceless guide on our tour who also has mentioned his visits in camp and interactions with POWs. As a young boy, he has worked in sawmill, was nearby the camp and he has told us that they also used to organize help for US officers who as a volunteer worked in sawmill. He with his friends used to gather eggs and give it to them with other spontaneously gathered food. He also, as an assistant of electrician, had permission to enter the camp terrains. He was twice inside the theatre barrack, as he has recalled. He has told us that the POWs were allowed to leave the camp and to go for the "parole walks" in direction to the nearby lake, where they used to swim during the scorching days. We all have learned many interesting facts regarding the times where the American officers were here, but also regarding the previous camps for RAF pilots, which was at the same place. Mr. Hyży showed us where Kriegies used to dig a tunnel. We all have visited the carpenter's shop, where the scale model is built and has finished our tour at the office of the Reform School Director, Mr. Wiesław Guzinski.

The last stage of the tour was meeting with Mr. Roman Dudziak, whose grandfather has saved life of Frank Diggs and Nelson Tacy hiding them in his house after they have escaped the Long March in 1945. Mr. Dudziak has recalled this story as heard from his father Jan Dudziak, as well as, he has told us about the friendship between Diggs and Dudziak families lasting for today and about all their reunions. Thanks to Peggy Dicks for possibility of contacting Mr. Dudziak.

Thank you for the invaluable help to Mrs. Agnieszka Jakiełek, who served as an interpreter.

On August 8, I emailed the following to members of our Oflag 64 family:

Dear Oflag 64 Family,

As I receive mail from our Oflag 64 family, I note by the AXPOW stickers or return address mail labels that several of you are affiliated with the AXPOW Organization. Over time, I have learned that they put out a bi-monthly bulletin, which is full of information for ex-pows and their family members. 




The following photos of Kriegy Joe Zelazny's History Preservation Project were sent to us by him.



Edmon "Ted" L. Rinehart 1920 ~ 2013



Mr. Edmon Loftin Rinehart, 93, a noted Montgomery lawyer, descendant of an early Alabama family, and former prisoner of war, died Tuesday, June 11, 2013, in a local hospital after a brief illness.

Mr. Rinehart was born in New York City in 1920 and spent his

boyhood in Indianapolis, Ind. He completed his secondary education at Andover Academy in Massachusetts before graduating from Princeton in 1942. He then became a field artillery officer in the 10th Field Artillery Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division, fighting in North Africa, Sicily, and Italy. In January 1944, assigned to the Rangers as part of a night

assault mission to break out of the Anzio beachhead, he was captured and spent the rest of the war in a German POW camp, Oflag 64, in Szubin, Poland. After the war, Mr. Rinehart attended and graduated from Harvard



Law School. During the Korean War, he returned to Army active duty, serving in Germany with the first U.S. Army units to be dispatched under NATO to protect from Warsaw Pact aggression, and he remained in the Army Reserve for 30 years, retiring as a lieutenant colonel.

He moved to Montgomery in 1955 to become an assistant attorney general working with his friend and former Army colleague, newly elected Alabama Attorney General John Patterson. In 1958 he represented Alabama before the U.S. Supreme Court in the very important First Amendment case, *NAACP v. Alabama*. He went on to serve as Gov. Patterson's Commissioner of Insurance for three years before joining the Birmingham law firm Deramus & Johnson. Several years later he and Gov. Patterson formed a law partnership and practiced together for over 20 years. In retirement Mr. Rinehart was active in the English-Speaking Union, serving as its president for several years.

His great-great grandfather, Thomas Bibb, of Amherst, Va., was one of the earliest settlers and landowners in the Huntsville area and a cousin of the first governor, William Wyatt Bibb. His great grandfather, Dr. William Durham Lyles, was the surgeon-general of the First Corps of the Army of Mississippi under Bishop General Leonidas Polk and senior medical officer at the Battle of Shiloh. Dr. Lyles also served in the Alabama and Mississippi legislatures and was briefly in the news business as owner of the *Pickensville Register*, an early Alabama newspaper.

His wife of 60 years, Barbara Lutz Rinehart, and his brother, Robert Lyle Rinehart, also of Montgomery, predeceased him. He is survived by his children, Robert Bruce Rinehart (Fairlie) of Montgomery and Christine Rinehart Taft ((John) of Washington, D.C.; and four grandchildren: Robert Loftin Rinehart and James Fairlie Rinehart of Montgomery, and Elizabeth Young Jordan and Stephen Alexander Rinehart Taft of Washington D.C.

Visitation will be at St. John's Episcopal Church at 1 p.m. on Saturday. The funeral service will be at 2 p.m. Saturday at St. John's. The family requests that in lieu of flowers, any donations be made to Saint John's Episcopal Church where Mr. Rinehart was a long time communicant.

Pallbearers will include former Governor John M. Patterson, David Pope of Atlanta, Colonel Albert L. Patterson, United States Army Retired of Huntsville, Major General Will Hill Tankersley, United States Army Retired of Montgomery, Arthur Nead of New Orleans, William H. McLemore of Montgomery, Richard Amberg of Montgomery, Edward Woodson of Montgomery and Judge Sibley Reynolds of Clanton.
