We are working to scan photocopies of stories or articles to add to our Archives. Depending on what the stories consist of, they may be found in different places within the POW Stories section. The categories include: Capture and Camp Life, The Long Cold March, The Hammelburg Affair, Escape to Russia and All Those Brave Young Men. Within each of these categories, there are further breakdowns. If you don't see a file you have sent, please let us know so we can get it uploaded or let you know where it is on the site.

Most photos of individuals can be found in the Galleries section of our site. As we receive them we add photos of the camp, camp activities, and Kriegies then and now. So far, we have had no problem accessing them at our end but would like to know if you do. Other CDs/DVDs have been received and will be uploaded or linked as soon as we figure out the best way to do that.

It is our hope to link publications by our Kriegies or about our Kriegies in the Links section under a publications heading. This is in the works and isn't found there yet.







Alexander R. "Bud" Bolling 1922 ~ 2011



ALEXANDER RUSSELL ("BUD") BOLLING, JR., passed away on October 6, 2011; he was born in Ft. McPherson, Georgia, on September 11, 1922, the son of the late Lt. General and Mrs. Alexander R. Bolling.

Bud and his late wife, Fran, are survived by their: daughter, Kathryn Bolling; son and wife, Russ and Elaine Bolling; granddaughter and husband, Karen and Brian Ide; grandson and wife, Russ and Mackenzie Woodward; grandson and fiancee, Ryan Bolling and Glenda Romero; grandson, Tyler Bolling; granddaughter, Brooke Bolling; and great-grandchildren, Ethan and Lauren Ide. True to his sense of humor, he was known affectionately as "Uncle Bud" by his grandchildren and great-grandchildren and will be deeply missed by his family and friends.

He entered the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1940. Graduating in 1943, he crossed Utah Beach in France in the summer of 1944 in command of an infantry

platoon. Wounded and captured in January 1945, he escaped the following March and joined the 84th Infantry Division, finishing the war on the Elbe River as a Rifle



Company Commander, Following six months of occupation in Germany, he was returned to West Point to teach German. The subsequent 28 years were characterized by assignments that would prepare him for the highest public positions. Fluent in German and Portuguese and conversant in French, he served twice in Brazil, once in Taiwan, and twice in Vietnam. His schooling included the United States Military Academy, the Infantry School (where he also served as a Tactics Instructor), the Command & General Staff College, and the Army War College. He served twice on the Army General Staff and led troops at every level of command commensurate with his rank. In 1968, while commanding the 3rd Brigade of the 82nd

Airborne Division, he was ordered to deploy immediately with his entire unit to Vietnam to counter the North Vietnamese Tet offensive. During this combat service, he was promoted to Brigadier General, only to receive another promotion to Major General in less than two years.

In 1973, after more than 30 years of service to his country, Bud retired and settled with his beloved wife in Dallas. Never inactive, he immediately became an Executive with a K-Mart Corporation subsidiary and subsequently developed a computer service company for physicians, which entered the public arena in the 1980's. In 1985, he retired again and devoted his time to writing and publishing, to his church, to service in several academic, philanthropic, and patriotic organizations, and to his family.

Recognition of his accomplishments was manifold. Military decorations included two Distinguished Service Medals, three Legions of Merit, two Silver Stars for gallantry in combat, three Bronze Stars for valor, 18 Air Medals, the Purple Heart, the Combat Infantry Badge with Star, the U.S., Vietnamese, and Brazilian parachute badges, and a number of foreign decorations. Additionally, he received numerous awards for his civic service to the many communities with which he had been involved. Despite all of this, Bud always said that his only desire was described in a line from his West Point Alma Mater: "And when our work is done, our course on earth is run, may it be said "Well done!! Be thou at peace."

Curtis Jones Was First Goalie for Duke Soccer Team

Wednesday, June 25, 2014 - 3:10pm



Curtis Scott Jones died on Sunday, June 22, at the Henrietta Brewer House in Vineyard Haven. He was 97.

He was born in Newton to Fred P. Jones and Ruth S. Smith. He moved to Greenlawn, N.Y., where he

graduated from high school. His parents moved to Swarthmore, Pa., in 1937 and Curtis went on to Duke University. At Duke University he received a degree in business administration, but his real interest was in sports. He was the first goalie for the undefeated, unscored upon Duke soccer team. He was the manager for the Duke basketball team during his junior and senior years. After graduation he moved to New York City, and worked for the International Publishers for South America. His job was translating American comic books into Spanish. The one thing that he remembered most about his job there was meeting Carmen Miranda.

In February 1942 Curtis was drafted into the U.S. Army and entered Officer Candidate School. He was deployed overseas to Northern Ireland. He became the executive officer of C Company 133 in the infantry, 34th division. They were sent to Northern Africa. While in Tunisia,

he was captured by Rommel's forces. He eventually ended up in Poland at OFLAG 64 POW camp where he remained until January 1945. He was honorably



discharged from the Army in December 1945. He joined the reserves and was a member until his retirement in 1965. He was recalled into active service during the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1961 and was in charge of the Strategic Intelligence Transportation Department for a year while stationed at Fort Eustis, Va.

Curtis married Norma Atherholt from Norwood, Pa., in 1946. They spent their earlier years residing in Wallingford, Pa., Beaver, Pa., and Swathmore, Pa. This is where they raised their family. They had a fun and active social life and valued their many friends. They celebrated New Year's Eve with the same group of friends for more than 50 years.

Curtis was employed for the Homer Laughlin China Company from 1956 to 1986. His major account was the Marriot Corporation. Upon his retirement, he still kept that account for the company.

In 2003, he and his wife moved to Martha's Vineyard to be near his daughter and her family. They resided at Havenside in Vineyard Haven. He was an avid reader and proponent for public libraries. He loved that he could walk down the street to the local library. There was always a stack of books next to his chair.

He loved education and volunteerism. He and his wife attended 29 Elderhostels all over the world after his retirement. They volunteered at the Martha's Vineyard Museum and the West Tisbury Farmers' Market.

Curtis was a member of the Cape Cod Chapter of the Military Officers of America Association and enjoyed attending their monthly meetings.

He was survived by his wife Norma, his daughter Nancy Van Blaricum, her husband Paul and granddaughter Brynn Van Blaricum; his daughter Deborah Koines, her husband Peter and granddaughter Erica Koines, granddaughter Olivia Giordano and her husband Carl, grandson Nicholas Koines and greatgrandson TJ Zapata. He was also survived by his brother Stuart Jones, his sister Rosamond Hammond and numerous nephews and nieces. He was predeceased by his brother Sumner Jones.

A memorial service will be held in Grace Church, William street in Vineyard Haven on Tuesday, July 8, at 3 p.m. Interment will follow in the memorial garden of Grace Church, with full military honors offered by the Veterans of Martha's Vineyard.

In lieu of flowers donations may be made to either Grace Church or the Martha's Vineyard Museum. Arrangements are under the care of the Chapman, Cole & Gleason Funeral Home in Oak Bluffs.

Richard H. Kellahan Sr. KINGSTREE - Richard "Dick" Herman Kellahan, son of Richard Melvin and Minnie Strong Kellahan, died peacefully at his home on January 12, 2014.

He was born on April 6, 1923, in Kingstree, South Carolina. His parents, his brother, W. N. Kellahan, his son, John Russell Kellahan, (Emmie Lou), his granddaughter Reid Louise Kellahan, his first wife, Addie McIntosh Kellahan and infant son preceded him in death. His wife of 65 years, Helen Reid Barker Kellahan of Lumberton, NC, a sister, Margaret K. Tyler, three sons, Richard H. Kellahan, Jr. (Nancy), Kenneth Reid Kellahan (Joni), and Christopher Patrick Kellahan (Jennifer), all of Kingstree, survive him. He also served as a director at the Kingstree Federal Savings and Loan, Williamsburg Regional Hospital, Williamsburg Academy, and Darlington Land Bank. Mr. Kellahan also joined the Kingstree Kiwanis Club and the Masonic Lodge. In addition, he served as a deacon and elder at the Williamsburg Presbyterian Church, and then became a charter member of the Kingstree Presbyterian Church where he also served as elder and elder emeritus.

Funeral service will be 2 PM Wednesday, January 15, 2014, in Kingstree Presbyterian Church, with burial in Williamsburg Cemetery. The family will receive friends Tuesday evening from 6 to 8 PM in the fellowship hall of Kingstree Presbyterian Church. Ray J. Klinkenborg 1917 ~ 2014



Ray Klinkenborg, age 97 of Rock Rapids, IA died Sunday, August 17, 2014 at Lyon Manor Nursing & Rehabilitation Center in Rock Rapids, IA. Memorial service will be 11:00 a.m. Thursday August 21st at the Congregational United Church of Christ in Rock

Rapids, IA with Rev. Dean Shelly officiating.

Burial will take place prior to the service on Thursday morning. Family and friends will gather at the funeral home in Rock Rapids at 9:00 a.m. before processing to Riverview Cemetery in Rock Rapids.

Visitation will be Wednesday August 20th from 2 to 8 p.m. with family present from 6 to 8 p.m. at the Jurrens Funeral Home of Rock Rapids, IA.

In lieu of flowers family wishes memorials be made to Lyon County Hospice.

Ray was born January 26, 1917 to Enno and Grace (Kruse) Klinkenborg near George, lowa, where he lived until he graduated from George High School in 1935. Ray attended lowa Teacher's College in Cedar Falls until 1939 and then joined the Army in 1940, prior to the United States entering WWII. Ray served as an officer in European campaigns, where he was awarded the Silver Star, our nation's third highest military decoration for valor. He served, first in Italy, and then France, where he was captured by German

forces. He was interned in OFLAG 64, a prisoner of war camp in Poland. When the Russians began their push through Poland, the German soldiers began a



forced march of the OFLAG 64 prisoners, during which Ray escaped and made it back to Allied forces. Upon his return from overseas he married Eleanor Jammer on December 24, 1946. Eleanor passed away in 1975. After the war, Ray worked for a short time as the Lyon County Veterans Affairs officer and

then in the ASCS office where he worked as director until he retired in 1979. On November 24, 1981 Ray was united in marriage to Nancy Broesder, becoming a stepfather to Joshua Pilcher and later Ray and Nancy had a daughter, Abby. Ray enjoyed fishing, golfing, travel and gardening.

He is survived by his wife, Nancy; his daughter, Abby Kempema, her husband Cory Kempema, and their children, Logan and Raelyn of Sioux City, IA; son, Joshua Pilcher, his wife Amy Pilcher and their children, Aria and Carter of Ames, IA; nieces, nephews and other extended family members.

Ray was preceded in death by his parents, Enno and Grace; first wife, Eleanor; brother, Elmer Klinkenborg; and sisters, Selma Hilbrands and Anita Hamlin.
