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



Kriegy Bios, Artifacts, Artifact Descriptions

We're happy to include the following family-written bio in this issue of the ITEM. It was written and submitted by Kate Kennedy Hines and her siblings. Photos are from their family files.

2LT Gibson Bell Kennedy 1920 - 1971



Gibson Bell Kennedy, a World War II prisoner of war and later a successful businessman, was born in the Chestnut Hill section of Philadelphia September 1, 1920.

The second of three boys, he was the son of Elizabeth Wheeler Kennedy and Albert Edward Kennedy, Jr., both of Philadelphia. By agreement, when the three boys were still young, their parents left them in the care of their maternal grandmother, widow Laetitia Wheeler Bell, and her second husband, The Rev. Dr. Gibson Bell, after whom Mr. Kennedy was named.

Dr. Bell was founder and headmaster of the Montgomery School, a private preparatory boy's school, at the time located in Wynnewood, PA. Mr. Kennedy attended the school, graduating in 1938 and joined Harvard College's Class of 1942.

He left Harvard midway through his sophomore year and joined the First Troop Philadelphia City Cavalry, a National Guard unit tracing its history back to 1774 and the American Revolution.

Mr. Kennedy entered active service in February, 1941, serving both domestically and abroad. He was a Second Lieutenant assigned to the 326th Engineer Battalion of the 101st Army Airborne Division when he parachuted into Normandy on D-Day, June 6, 1944, and was captured by German troops.

He was sent to Oflag 64, a German prisoner-ofwar camp for American officers located in Szubin, Poland. In 1945, he escaped either from the camp itself or during the forced march to German soil, resulting from German fears the

camp would be liberated by advancing Russian troops.

He made his way to safety and returned to American soil September 4, 1945 and was honorably discharged the following December 8.

During those three months of domestic duty Mr. Kennedy promoted War Bonds and made condolence calls to the families of servicemen killed in action.

One of those was Marine Sergeant William Henry Palmer Townsend, of Philadelphia, an acquaintance of Mr. Kennedy's, who was killed during the assault on Iwo Jima February 19, 1945. During his call on Sergeant Townsend's family, Mr. Kennedy met the elder of his two sisters, Mona Townsend. The two were married November 15, 1946 in Philadelphia.

After the war, Mr. Kennedy was employed by the Philco Corporation, at the time a leading manufacturer of consumer electronics. He worked in sales for the company in Philadelphia, Dallas, Boston, and Philadelphia again, returning there in 1957.

He rose to become Vice President in charge of Sales and Marketing for the company until it was acquired by the Ford Motor Company in 1961.

He subsequently worked as a consultant for TRW, an Ohio-based automotive and aerospace engineering concern and in 1963 moved with his family to England for an executive role with Standard Electric Corp., a UK-based consumer product company owned by ITT.

In 1964, Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy's marriage ended in divorce. He subsequently married Kay Doherty, of London.

He died May 12, 1971 in a swimming accident off the coast of Majorca, a Spanish island in the Mediterranean, and was buried in a London England cemetery.

At the time of his death, Mr. Kennedy was survived by his wife, Kay, and four children: William Townsend Kennedy; Gibson Bell Kennedy, Jr.; Laetitia Elizabeth Kennedy and Katherine Culzean Kennedy.

Please consider writing a biography for your Kriegy. Biographies will be used in the future museum as part of an interactive display for each Kriegy.





Artifact Description: Original American Red Cross Parcel Box (Food Package No. 10)

Artifact History: This American Red Cross Food Package No. 10 box manufactured in May 1944 once held 4 individual Red Cross food parcels. American Red Cross parcel boxes were critical to supplementing the diets of the Oflag 64 Kriegies. The German ration for the Oflag 64 Kriegies was about 1,200 calories per day, and without the supplemental calories from the food in the American Red Cross parcels and personal food parcels sent by the families of the Kriegies, many of the Kriegies could have developed very serious health issues.

In the last two issues of the ITEM, mention was made of Tin Store renovations and readiness for an eventual opening. Things are moving along but it's not ready to open just yet. We will let you know as time draws near.





Mariusz Winiecki is always on the lookout for things that might have been part of Oflag 64's history. Recently he noticed that the original Oflag 64 barbed wire, between the White House and the Kommandant's house, was still there but in jeopardy of being scrapped due to reno-

vations on the White House and Hospital nearby. So he rescued it for the museum. We appreciate his keen observation.

These photos show work being done outside the Tin Store, landscaping, etc. Notice the cobblestones at the top left of the photo on the far right. They discovered were when the renovations began and were most likely originally placed where they were found, but there's no information





yet as to whether placement was prewar or postwar. Grass will be planted on the slope which was recently formed. More photos will be forthcoming as changes or improvements take place.

Lastly, as was mentioned earlier in this issue, the renovations to the former Oflag 64 Chapel have been completed. As reported on the Facebook page of the Polish-American Foundation for the Commemoration of POW Camps in Szubin https://www.facebook.com/oflag64altburgund/, St. Anne's Church was consecrated on July 27th and is once again serving the faithful. For those who have visited the former chapel in Szubin, you'll agree that this is truly a remarkable and beautiful transformation.





The following two articles, written while our Kriegies were at Oflag 64, were sent to us by Marvin Williams, whose father was a Kriegy at another POW camp. Note the names of our Kriegies mentioned in the articles.

Oflag 64 February 14, 1944

Dear Folks:

As requested I am sending tidbits of POW activity. Our "Kriegy College of Greater Knowledge" is very fortunate in having enrolled several officers of note from the field of entertainment. While they are not professional artists, they all have experience of college entertainment. Most say they hope someday to make entertaining their careers. Our choral group has progressed under the able direction of 1st Lt. Russell Ford, who hails from East Orange, N. J., and who sang as soloist in Grace Church, N. Y. Featured as baritone soloist in our choral group is 1st Lt. Tom Holt, a student of U. of North Carolina. Holt's ambition is to sing at the Metropolitan Opera in New York. The choral group has 21 mixed voices and an accompanist. On Sundays they sing in the chapel during services. The three most popular books in camp are: Low Man on a Totem Pole, Epic of America, and The Robe (story of Jesus). Reading is our greatest diversion.

Thirty Men Pass College Entrance Exams At Oflag 64; 40 Courses Are Offered

Three hundred American officers held at Oflag 64 are attending 40 different educational courses running a 12-hour day starting at 8:40 a.m., Henry Soederberg, neutral Y.M.C.A. worker, reported following a visit he made to the camp on November 20, traveling by automobile over bad roads and through heavy snow and rain storms.

New school rooms have greatly helped the holding of formal classes at the camp, and 30 students recently passed college entrance examinations. The faculty, under the direction of Captain H. D. Eldridge of Denver, Col., consists of 35 well qualified teachers, Soederberg said. Among the courses offered are three in law, seven foreign languages, six in mathematics, five in English grammar, four in social science and three in science.

The hospital attached to the camp has received consignments of plates and cooking utensils from the Y.M.C.A., and the patients are very pleased with them, it was stated. A large shipment of lumber, a precious item in prison camps, has arrived from the "Y" in Sweden. The men use lumber to build chapels, school rooms, theatrical stages, furniture, book shelves and many other things they otherwise might do without.

There was great excitement for some of the officers when Soederberg presented them with a hare that had just been shot in the fields outside the camp. The Y.M.C.A. worker had lunch with Col. Schaefer and Capt. Floyd Burgeson, and brought a new pair of eyeglasses to Col. Faul Goode, the Senior American Officer who has replaced Col. Thomas Drake, repatriated with the last exchange of prisoners.

Morale at the camp is good, Soeder-

Morale at the camp is good, Soederberg said, adding that he had a long conference with the six chaplains.

Stephen B. Kochy 1920 ~ 2005




Stephen B. Kochy, 84, of Houston, Texas died March 7, 2005.

Wilbur "Bill" Blaine Sharpe, Jr., of Ashburn, VA, and previously of Bethesda, MD, passed on Sunday, July 3, 2022. Born June 24, 1922, in Lebanon, IN. Bill was a U.S. Army veteran of both WWII

and Korea. During WWII, Bill was a POW at Oflag 64 in Szubin, Poland, from 1943 to 1945. Bill married the love of his life, Mary Eileen Glenn, in



1946 and the couple soon welcomed their daughter, Cynthia Louise. During his 40+ year civilian career, Bill lent his retail management talents to Kay Jewelers, Woodward and Lothrop Department Stores, and Burberrys of London. He was a devoted community service participant in Chambers of Commerce, Rotary International as a Paul Harris fellow, and as the founder of the first Polish American non-profit, the Polish-American Foundation for the Commemoration of POW Camps in Szubin. Bill was an unflagging optimist, a classic gentleman, and admired by all those who knew him.

Bill is survived by his daughter, Cynthia Burgess (husband, Glenn) and granddaughter Lauren Burgess. Bill was preceded by his parents, Hattie Olive Shaw and Wilbur Blaine Sharpe, Sr., two brothers, three sisters, and his cherished wife, Mary, who passed away in September 2020.
