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

Dear Oflag 64 Family,

A tri-fold brochure with accompanying letter was recently sent by the Polish-American Foundation President and Chairman of Friends of Oflag 64 (our nonprofit) to all members of the Oflag 64 Family for whom we have street addresses. If you have not received one and would like to, please email us your street address and we will add you to our list.

The letter describes museum efforts that have been made both on the Polish side and on the American side as well as the progress on the museum project to date. Janet Straight Dye, daughter of the late Kriegy Fay M. Straight, wrote in response to a previous question we had about where Kriegies marched and when, since all didn't end up in the same place. She responded: "My father, Fay M. Straight was marched out of Oflag 64 on January 21, 1945. The group he was with arrived in Luckenwalde on February 20, 1945 by train. He had dysentery and stayed in Luckenwalde until liberated by the Russians in late April (21st, I think) and walked/rode a bicycle to the Allied lines by May 5, 1945." She also commented that she has his War Log which documents the long march, line by line, from January 21, 1945 to February 20, 1945. He entitled it "Diary of Move from Oflag 64". Janet, information is gladly received no matter when it comes. Thanks for all the information you've shared so far. Would you consider writing your father's bio and donating any of his artifacts? Let us know and we'll fill you in on the process.



Mark Evans, son of the late Kriegy Warren "Bing" Evans, sent his dad's Wartime Log along with several letters from Warren to his future wife and vice versa. These artifacts are such treasures and we are indebted

to Mark for donating them to the new museum. (See the Kriegy News and Information Section.) Wartime logs, no matter who provided them for the Kriegies during the war, are great historical sources and are cherished by the recipients of the donation. Season 7's episode features Kriegy Jimmie Kanaya who was captured in France in October 1944 and transferred to Oflag 64. 

The compass buttons were to be used as escape aids when possible and were from one of the uniforms worn by their father, the late Kriegy James T. Godfrey. Kay and her brother are donating the button to the museum. Kriegy James T. Godfrey wrote his own explanation of the cigarette boxes shown below.

THE LONG MARCH REVISITED - 2005

I have long wanted to visit the villages where Don and the other men of Oflag 64 spent their nights on the march during the winter of 1945. Don described the crowded and uncomfortable sleeping arrangements in barns and various other buildings. My wish became possible when the former East Germany became part of the reunited country again.

In June 2005, my friend, Charlene, and I rented a car in Berlin and drove north towards the Polish border at the Oder River near Swinemünde. We did not want to venture into Poland. Prior to leaving home, we plotted an approximate plan of travel. We hoped that we would find locals who remembered those difficult days and the American POWs.

Garz was the first village we visited, and as far east as we drove. From there, we followed the March route and photographed barns, churches and other buildings where we thought the POWs had likely spent their nights. We missed only a couple of villages along the way between Garz and Parchim.

We observed that very little development had occurred in this area of Mecklenburg-Vorpommern during the 40 plus years of Communism. We felt that this was to our advantage, because we were able to capture the buildings in photographs much the way they probably looked when the POWs were there. The only improvements we found were where people had "cleaned up, fixed up, and painted up" their hotels, restaurants, and homes. The main roads and autobahns were in excellent condition, no doubt having been improved since being reunited with the West.

Wherever we drove, we saw very few people. Everyone seemed to be keeping a low profile and staying out of sight. Maybe this is a habit developed for survival under the old regime! The people we did see and stopped to talk with were too young to remember anything about the war--except for one man in his sixties, but who looked to be much older. We saw him standing on a corner outside of town and thought he would be our "likely candidate." We pulled alongside, rolled down our window, and asked if he spoke English. Imagine our surprise when he slapped his knee and, with a big smile on his face said, "Goddammit! Goddammit!" We don't think he ever expected to hear someone speaking English. It seems he had grown up in Chicago, after having been born in Germany. Eventually he and his parents moved back to Germany, where he was "stuck" and not able to return to the States. So, he was not there at the end of the war and was no help to us at all. We sure did get a big laugh out of that encounter!

We visited Hammelburg during the "Bonnfest," festival. Peter Domes met us and showed us an impressive special display of the route taken by Abe Baum and his Task Force, and the resulting battle in the Task Force's effort to free the American POWs at Oflag XIII-B.
























































Long, Cold March drawing by the late Kriegy Jim Bickers

Rocco P. Pravidica, 99, passed away on October 30, 2020 surrounded by loving family. Born September 22, 1921 in Centerville, Iowa he was son to John and Elizabeth (Sacco). He

also had three siblings, Elizabeth, John and Charlie. A 1939 graduate of Centerville High School, he spent some time at Indian Hills Community College before joining the US Army. Rocco ended up being a Prisoner of War for 27 months in Germany before being able to come home to the United States. He married Lois

Valentine on May 17, 1975 in Rockford Illinois. A longtime member of St. Bernadette Catholic Church and the Eagles Club, Rocco also enjoyed fishing, golfing and was a big Notre Dame and Packers fan. He was a very intelligent and humble man, every person Rocco met he treated as a friend.

Winifred L. Ball 1919 ~ 2019


