They have run out of attendees. It made me think, how many OFLAG 64 alumni are still living? What was the total number of US POWs in OFLAG 64? By way of unrelated information, John sent a video of him taken after he got his 5th hole-in-one since October 2011, at age 84. Thanks, John, for writing and letting us know about the Doolittle Raiders. It's said to see the Greatest Generation passing away. To our knowledge there are about 125 of the original approximately 1500 still living. Congratulations on your golfing achievements.

EILEEN BAUM from San Diego (widow of the late Kriegy Abe Baum) sent a nice thank you note following the passing of Abe. She wrote: "Thank you for your kind thoughts and support during this difficult time. It meant a lot to me." *Thank you, Eileen, for your sweet card. Our thoughts and prayers are with you.*

DENNIS P. BROWN (relative of the late Kriegy Lloyd A. Brown and a new Oflag 64 family member) wrote: "The following individual passed away on 25 May, 1998 in San Jose, California.

Thank you for updating your records. And thank you for keeping them. *Thanks, Dennis, for your updates and welcome to our Oflag 64 family. We appreciate hearing of changes that need to be made so we can keep our information current.*

FRANCES M. BUCK from Henderson NV (daughter of the late Kriegy Frederic Marks) sent a donation to the Postage Fund and asked about obtaining a copy of the PBS documentary on Oflag 64. She wrote: "I've failed in my efforts to find it. My two daughters and I are quite interested. I spoke to my stepbrother, who apparently has the pictures, telegrams, and newspaper articles my dad had. He is going to try to scan them. I will send them to you, if he succeeds. My memories of those pictures were that they were in the camp, of injured soldiers, both German and American, and a couple of the prisoners eating Red Cross chocolate." In a separate email she commented that the Oflag 64 DVD was very interesting and thanked us for sending it. She said it elucidated a lot. *Thank you, Frances, for your thoughtful donation to our Postage Fund. We appreciate the great support. We're also happy we could send you the Oflag 64 DVD.*

T. J. BUGG from West Chester OH (son of Kriegy Thomas J. Bugg, Jr.) wrote regarding the passing of one of our Kriegy Heroes: "Where it is not my place to make you or the OFLAG group aware of the passing of another great hero; I did want you to know that I was made aware of the passing of Edwin James (Jim) Betts earlier this morning (April 5th, 2013) in Clifton Texas. His daughter Jeanie had made me aware by a short note in the early a.m. today. I believe Jim was 1 month shy of turning 96. She and her sisters Janice and Jo Ann have kept contact with me over the years. The connection to me was that I had sought out and found her father as he was connected to us by OFLAG 64 notices and he, and one other man, had shared the entire march of 350+ miles together in 1945 with my Dad, Thomas J. Bugg, Jr.; depending on each other for survival during that arduous forced march. Either their family will provide an obituary in the coming days or I will find one and send it to you, but for now it has been a very sad day for me. I had enjoyed chatting with Jim over the years and getting to know him and the stories he told about Dad and even my Mom from back in the 1944-1946 time frame while they had served together. Prayers to them and their family during this most difficult time and a salute and thank you for Jim's selfless service and sacrifice to our country! May God Bless him always and forever as well as all the other "Kriegys". Humbly, T.J." Additionally, he wrote: "Actually - Past Hammelburg. After the 2-day liberation at that camp ----- he was then recaptured and then further marched down to Moosburg where he and my father were liberated on April 29th 1945. Just a small point - Thank you for your work on those POW's behalf! Thanks, TJ, for sending us the information about the passing of Jim Betts and your connection to his family. It's always a sad day when we hear about another dear Kriegy passing. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family.



TOM COBB from Columbia SC (son of the late Kriegy George A. Cobb) wrote regarding the Seattle Reunion choice: "Great choice! I believe a Kriegy should always be the first choice." *Thank you, Tom, for your*

support. We wholeheartedly agree.

DONALD J. COHN (nephew of the late Kriegy Thurston "Ted" Quincy Garrett, Jr.) wrote: "My child is doing research for a 5th grade history assignment. She wanted her subject to be our Uncle Ted -Thurston Quincy Garrett, Jr. - who served our great country in WWII and was stationed at Camp Gruber in 1943 and a member of the 90th Infantry. We found papers stating he invented a special mortar round and received a Letter of Commendation from then Brigadier General Harry Collins while at Camp Gruber. The papers also state he was working on designs for other weapons. Uncle Ted ultimately was captured and sent to Oflag 64 until the end of the war. My question is - is it possible to learn more about his works while stationed at Camp Gruber or while in the military or during his imprisonment at Oflag 64? My daughter is very interested in American History and what better way to learn it than through researching someone "she knows". If there is another entity I should contact, I would appreciate any insight that you might have." He further added: "I am Donald Cohn, great nephew of the late Thurston "Ted" Quincy Garrett, Jr. and I have emailed the 90th a few times regarding Ted, a 1st Lt. and member of the US 3rd Army, 90th Infantry Division "Tough Ombres", 358th Regiment (Not certain which Company) during World War II. Uncle Ted trained in Oklahoma's Camp Gruber in the Rainbow Division and received a Letter of Commendation from the Brigadier General for inventing an improved practice mortar shell while stationed at Camp Gruber. Then at some point he boarded a ship headed for the European Theater, and he and many other brave soldiers battle began on D-Day. He fought across France and at the Battle of Metz in 1944 was surrounded and captured as I was told. The Nazis took him and transported him to Poland's Oflag 64 for his imprisonment. Uncle Ted had told me that the Russians were moving westward and the Nazis marched the POWs from Oflag 64 back towards Germany (if I recall) until the Russian Army finally caught up with them and the Nazis fled, leaving the US POWs in the custody of the Russian Army. But instead of welcoming their Western Allies, Uncle Ted said that the Russians held him and other officers as political prisoners until he and several others devised an escape plan and indeed escaped and trekked across the countryside until reaching Western Allied Forces. Thank you for your time. It is appreciated." Thanks, Donald, for your email and for the information you have provided. We don't have an answer about Camp Gruber. Perhaps someone

reading this ITEM will know more. We hope your daughter finds the information she is wanting.

KAY GODFREY CRUISE from Omaha NE (daughter of the late Kriegy, Dr. James T. Godfrey and a new member of our Oflag 64 family) wrote: "My father was a POW at Oflag 64 for part of his imprisonment. I would like to know if there is anyone still alive who knew him at the camp. He was captured in North Africa on Feb. 14, 1943. I just found this website and thank you for putting it together." In a separate email she asked for copies of the Roads to Liberation book by Clarence Meltesen in which her father is mentioned several times. She also sent a donation to our Postage Fund. Thank you, Kay for contacting us and welcome to our Oflag 64 family. Thanks also for your thoughtful donation to our Postage Fund. We hope you enjoy the "Roads" book and that you hear from others who may have known your father at Oflag 64.



KATHY EZELL from Miami FL (daughter of the late Kriegy William Warthen) wrote regarding the Seattle Reunion: "I am so glad that you are finding a way to continue. Seattle sounds perfect. I won't be

coming, however, and doubt very much that Ellen will because I don't think Mama will be up to such a trip." *Thanks, Kathy, for writing. It's always good to hear from you. Sorry to hear that you won't be able to make it to the Seattle Reunion. We will miss you and your family.*

BRIAN HANCOCK (from the UK and a new member of our Oflag 64 family)) recently found our website and wrote: "Hi, I hope you don't mind me getting in touch with you. I have recently gotten a hold of about 20 letters written by a German Officer Hauptman Hans Mulzer from Oflag XX1B. Do any of your members know of him? Any info would be most welcome. Thanks in advance. Brian" In another email he wrote: "I have sent one of the letters to a company that's guite local to me for a translation but because its hand written in old German it's got to be transcribed first then translated. I will wait and see what the cost of this is going to be before I get carried away and send them all! It would be great news to hear from any of the Vets and particularly if they remember this officer. Thank you, Brian, for contacting us and welcome to our Oflag 64 family. Keep us posted on your documents. We would love to know what information they contain.

BRODIE HAND (contacted us through our website) wrote: "I was in the hospital at Nuremburg with a Lt. who was captured at Hammelburg after trying to free Col. Waters and other prisoners. Can't remember his name. Do you know how I might locate him?" *Thanks, Brodie, for contacting us. We hope you*

were able to contact those whose names were forwarded to you.

RONALD NICHOLAS HARDY from Phoenixville PA (son of the late Kriegy Ronald R. Hardy) wrote: "I will be sending you this week a packet of materials including photos my father had as part of his Oflag 64 wartime log." After I received the materials he sent, he again wrote: "I am pleased that the photos I sent vou are not duplicates. I will do my best to provide you with better images to add to the web site. I'm afraid my father did not include first names with the photos. I was 17 years old when my father died and even though I asked my father he would never relate any information on his time in combat in North Africa or his experiences in Oflag 64. I do recall taking trips to Camden New Jersey to visit a fellow POW. I do not of the conversations recall any or the former prisoner's name. I've been reviewing the Oflag 64 web site on this very special day (Memorial Day). As I get older my appreciation of what my father and so many others endured fills me with pride. I am currently reading the 3rd volume of Rick Atkinson's Liberation Trilogy, The Guns At Last Light. The sacrifices made are beyond measure. I agree they were "The Greatest Generation." I reviewed the photos of those Kriegies who are alive today or have passed away. I would like to send you a photo of my father. It was the last photo taken of him prior to his death on April 15th 1964. My father was in his 2nd year of teaching elementary students. His photo was cropped from the class photo. Please let me know what I need to do to submit this photo to you. Once again I am pleased that I could provide you with new material for the web site." We eagerly await digital photos to upload to our website. In the meantime we will post what we can.

Thomas M. Holt 1919 - 2013

A true gentleman, soldier, and music aficionado died peacefully at his home in Brandon, MS on May 5, 2013 at the age of 93. Born on July 4, 1919 in Charlotte, NC to parents Earle Pendleton Holt, Sr. and Mary Eugenia Harris Holt, Tom was a beloved and devoted husband of 46 years to the late Forrestine Lorraine Holt (nee: Whitaker); brother to the late Dr. Earl P. Holt, Jrand uncle to Earl P. Holt III (Katherine); Wistar W. Holt (Judy Matthews); Richard O. Holt; and Isabel Lee Wiederaenders (Jim). Tom graduated from Oak Ridge Military Academy, Oak Ridge, NC in June, 1936 and Oak Ridge Junior College in June, 1938. He entered the University of North Carolina in Sept., 1938 and studied French and Literature until June, 1939, whereupon he entered the U.S. Army as a Second Lieutenant in the Infantry. Following 30 months of military training and commanding assignments at various U.S. Army bases, on December 24, 1941 Tom's unit sailed out of the New York harbor on the Queen Mary bound for Northern Ireland. He soon became a member of the First Ranger Battalion under the command of Lieutenant Colonel William O. Darby. While on a secret mission in Northern Africa, on December 24, 1943 Tom's Ranger unit was captured by the

Germans and he became a WW II P.O.W. for over 30 months, before escaping from the OFLAG 64 camp in Poznan, Poland in January, 1945. For



the next 2-3 months, Tom's separate, smaller group of 5 soldiers survived on meager rations and traveled over 750 miles, primarily on foot and occasionally by

train and truck. Their journey took them from Poznan, Poland to Odessa in the Ukraine on the Black Sea, where they were finally rescued by a U.S. Naval Transport in the Odessa harbor. Down to a weight of 125-130 lbs. while living on merely 500-600 calories per day during his capture. Tom spent the next year recovering in an Army hospital in Miami, Fla. Lieutenant Colonel Holt also served in the Korean War from 1951-1954 and was honorably discharged from the United States Army on July 4, 1979. Tom completed a Master's Degree in Voice at the Manhattan School of Music and later performed a solo recital at Carnegie Hall. He went on to become the leading baritone with the Charlotte Opera Company and performed numerous concerts throughout Europe. He also taught voice at many colleges and universities, including Catawba College, Salisbury, NC; Florida State Univ., Tallahassee, FL; Lenoir Rhyne College, Hickory, NC; Montevallo University, Montevallo, AL; and Millsaps College, Jackson, MS.

Services: Graveside burial will be at the United Methodist Church Cemetery, Oak Ridge, NC on Saturday May 11 at 12:00 noon. A memorial service will be held at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Flowood, MS at a later date to be announced.
