EARLY LIFE



Ray was known as an "Iowa boy" having been born near George, Iowa, to parents Enno and Grace (Kruse) Klinkenborg. After completing his public-school education, including graduating from George High School in 1935, Ray attended Iowa Teachers College in Cedar Falls, Iowa, until he joined the Army in 1940, enlisting on October 16,1940.

MILITARY SERVICE

Marching in the footsteps of thousands before and after him, LT Klinkenborg proceeded through the channels of military deportation the East Coast of the United States and boarded a troop ship on September 2, 1943; its destination: across the Atlantic Ocean to Italy where he participated in the Italian Campaign.

CITATION:

<u>SYNOPSIS</u>: The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress July 9, 1918, takes pleasure in presenting the Silver Star to First Lieutenant (Infantry) Ray J. Klinkenborg, United States Army, for gallantry in action while serving with Company E, 2d Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3d Infantry Division, in action against the enemy in Italy, on 29 February 1944. His gallant actions and dedicated devotion to duty, without regard for his own life, were in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

FURTHER MILITARY ACTION

LT. Klinkenborg's next engagement with the enemy occurred in France where he was captured on 5 September 1944 by the Germans with arrival at Oflag 64 in Poland on 29 September 1944.

Forced to evacuate the camp with other Americans on January 21, 1945, Ray had survived many months of hardships before departing from Odessa, arriving at the U.S. on 9 April 1945.

LIFE AFTER THE ARMY

Ray Klinkenborg and Eleanor Jammer were married on 6 December 1946, a marriage which lasted until her death in 1975. His professional life was spent working as the Lyon County Veterans Affairs Officer and then in the ACS office where he worked as director until he retired in 1979.

In 1981, he married Nancy Broesder, sharing their lives with an extended family. After enjoying his retirement years of fishing, golfing, travel and gardening, Ray died on 17 August 2014.

Ray John Klinkenborg was buried with military honors at Riverview Cemetery in Rock Rapids, Iowa.
