KRIEGY NEWS AND INFORMATION

Our friend in Poland, Mariusz Winiecki, who is doing a project relating to Oflag 64 for the museum there, recently found the following photos. The photos can be found on line at: http://www.bildindex.de/obj20145712.html

By way of explanation, the photos were taken by the Germans sometime in the early 1940s and are published at:

Mariusz wrote: The quality of the pictures is surprisingly good in comparison to others of that time period. The pictures might be dated before the first group of American POWS arrived there, but in fact it is the same camp.



Picture 01 shows the chapel and the corner watchtower. The Goon guard can be seen near the watchtower.

Picture 02 is taken from the backside of the camp. The hospital is at the upper left.



Picture 03 shows the front of 'kommendant building'. The next building seen behind is the 'white house'. On the fence there is a sign and on it is written "Oflag XXIB, kommendant". The inscription confirms that the pictures were taken before US officers came to Szubin. The prisoners (French and British RAF officers) of the Oflag XXIB located in Szubin were moved to the Oflag IIB in Arnswalde in the spring of 1943, when their Oflag closed because the Germans needed more soldiers. The keepers of that Oflag would have been sent to the front. After the US POWs arrived, the camp was reopened with a new number, Oflag 64.



Picture 04 is unlabeled. If you know anything about it, please contact Elodie at the address information on the front page of this ITEM.

James Wignall, nephew of Kenneth Murdoch Finlayson from Stalag VIIIB, submitted the following photos and descriptions of Kriegy artifacts.



1 - An armband with a red cross on it, presumably because he would have had to display it, as a POW, so the Germans knew his status in the camp.

2 - Two identity tags marked with Stalag VIII B and his POW no. 12299 and two rings of very cheap material, possibly hand made from scrap aluminum tins in the POW camp, with a buckle fastening and the name LAMSDORF marked on each ring. Any idea what these were for?





3 - A combined fork and spoon. Though they are marked, there are two sets of initials on them, AG & JM, neither of which are my Uncle's (KF). This suggests the previous owners either died or were moved to another camp. What do you think?

It may be better to add these photos for all members to see. Surprisingly I received a reply from the UK Army Medical Museum today and they are unable to identify either a use or purpose for the two rings. Could this be a problem for members to solve? What were the rings for and why were they made?

It is a privilege to be the custodian, not owner, of historical items such as these and I intend to document the Service and POW History of my Uncle for future generations, lest we forget.

Randy Clifton sent the following photos (and photo description) of David W. Clifton, his great uncle, during war years. The two pictures appear to be from before he was shipped into action (There are no other details regarding the date, location or the other men pictured). David Clifton is left side, front row. The second portrait is just an isolated headshot from the same picture.





This photo was submitted by Joseph Zelazny presently living in Tacoma WA. He is the past president of the East Valley Memorials Foundation, Inc. Their motto is: "Serving Those Who Served Us". This recently completed remembrance monument, honoring combat wounded, was dedicated February 20, 2012, Presidents' Day. Another monument is on the calendar for dedication later this year.

Lorin Griset 1919 ~ 2006

Lorin Griset, 86 Mayor of Santa Ana in the '60s



Lorin Griset, a former Santa Ana mayor who helped steer his city through racial tensions in the late 1960s, has died. He was 86.

Griset, an insurance broker and church deacon whose son Dan also later served as mayor, died Friday at Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian in Newport Beach from complications of a hematoma, family members said.

Born to a Santa Ana dairy farmer, Griset was elected to the City Council in 1967. Two years later, he became mayor as the city plunged into turmoil after the slaying of a Santa Ana police officer by a member of the Black Panthers.

Amid complaints that police looking for suspects were pulling innocent black residents out of their cars at gunpoint, Griset met with black ministers and protesters to quell tensions. He later helped launch the city's Human Relations Commission.

In 1971, he supported a plan to bus schoolchildren to achieve integration.

Not all of the lifelong Republican's views were liberal. When Santa Ana wanted to shut down a beer bar with nude entertainment, Griset accompanied a vice officer to the establishment and later testified in court that the performance he witnessed was obscene.

Before entering politics, Griset, a UCLA graduate, helped found a Christian businessmen's group and served as president of Goodwill Industries.

During World War II, while serving as an Army officer

in France, he was captured by the Germans and sent to a prison camp in Poland, his son Norman said Sunday. Griset and other POWs were later forced to march to Germany through the snow



as their captors fled advancing Russian troops. Griset was freed when the war ended, his son said.

Returning home, he set up an insurance business and -- as part of a promise he made to God as a POW -- embarked on various evangelism projects, such as spearheading an appearance by Billy Graham at Anaheim Stadium in 1969. He also served on the boards of Biola College and Wycliffe International, a missionary group founded by his uncle.

After leaving politics in 1975, Griset remained active in Christian circles, teaching Sunday school and serving as a deacon at Calvary Church of Santa Ana. His oldest son, Dan, was elected to the City Council in 1979 and served as mayor from 1984 to 1986.

A Santa Ana continuation high school scheduled to open later this year will be named the Lorin Griset Academy, relatives said.

Ohl was born July 10, 1920, in West Branch, Iowa, and adopted journalism as his field of study at the University of Iowa after discovering that pre-med courses weren't his cup of tea. Those studies, however, were interrupted by World War II.

Ohl was a lieutenant and saw action in France and Germany. He was captured and imprisoned in a German POW camp, Oflag 64 in Poland.



Six months later, Ohl and two other prisoners escaped and hid in a barn until Russian soldiers found them and assisted in their safe repatriation to the United States.

Returning to Iowa, Ohl worked for the Des Moines Register. And while on a blind date at a golf course, he met his future wife, Ruth Weisbrod, a World War II nurse. They married in 1952.

That same year, he was offered a job at the Independent Press-Telegram as city editor. He served the paper n a number of other positions until retiring.

As associate editor, Ohl was deeply involved in the successful efforts to change state legislation on tidelands funds, led the newspaper's editorial support of local hospitals and was a large part of the paper's effort to bring the Queen Mary to Long Beach, according to the family.

His quiet demeanor took a back seat when Ohl pressed home points on an issue recalled Editorial Page Editor Larry Allison. "He was very outspoken," he added.

Ohl would become a friend to city managers andmayors and he had a weekly Saturday date with Mayor Tom Clark ove a 25-year period.

"He was very supportive of the city," said Clark.

Ohl's service to the community included being a board member of the Red Cross, YMCA, St. Mary Medical Center, Long Beach Area Convention & Visitors Bureau and the children's Dental Health Clinic.

He is survived by his wife, Ruth, their four children, Rebecca Ohl and David Ohl of Long Beach; Richard Ohl of Westminster; and Marie LaRue of Gig Harbor, WA and children David, Vanessa, Kelsey, Ryan and Riley.

There will be a private family service. In lieu of flowers, the Ohls suggest donations to the Red Cross, he YMCA and the Los Altos Methodist Church.
